Prof. Shaul Sapir brought David Sassoon to life at the Rotary meeting last week

Tales of legend

There is more to David Sassoon than a statue and a library; Prof. Shaul Sapir separates myth and fact going all the way back to the opium trade

LAST TUESDAY, ON NOVEMBER 6TH, Prof. Shaul Sapir shared an experience all humans have shared - curiosity - and its consequences. In Sapir's case, he went into a museum, something he saw that triggered his interest and he tried to get to the bottom of it. Sapir is a professor at the Hebrew University and is an Israeli of Indian Baghdadi origin. This is why the statue of David Sassoon at David Sassoon Library caught his attention. In spite of having contributed to the heritage of Bombay, Sapir realised that there is very little known of the Baghdadi community here. This led him to research David Sassoon.

Shaul's dramatic voice, while narrating the history of David Sassoon, drew everyone's attention and interest. Shaul went on to mention how stories of the Sassoon dynasty were the stuff of both speculation and legend. Its ancient origins, followed by dealings in opium during the pioneering days, have together contributed to colourful myths. Among Bombay's chief benefactors, the Sassoon family was often referred to as: "The Rothschilds of India". Unlike the Rothschilds, the Sassoons were merchants, opium dealers and textile industrialists in the Far East who claimed Davidic (relating to the Biblical David and his descendants) and other descent and who socialised with British royalty in England.

After a brief introduction to the Sassoon legacy, Shaul revealed more insight on David Sassoon's life. He was the Chief Treasurer of Baghdad. Sassoon married Hannah in 1818. They had two sons and two daughters before she died in 1826. Two years later he married Farha Hyeem (who was born in 1812 and died in 1886). The pair had six sons and three daughters.

Following increasing persecution of Baghdad's Jews by Dawud Pasha, the family moved to Bombay via Persia. Bombay then was a town going through intense development and monumental changes under the British Raj. New opportunities were flourishing and Sassoon adapted to these changes very well. Sassoon was in business in Bombay no later than 1832, originally acting as a middleman between British textile firms and Gulf commodity merchants, subsequently investing in valuable local properties.

By 1840, Sassoon developed his textile operations into a profitable triangular trade: Indian yarn and opium were carried to China, where he bought goods which were sold in Britain, from where he obtained Lancashire cotton products. In addition, he traded in textiles, tea, dried fruit, metals and other goods as well as in real estate enterprises in Bombay, Shanghai and Hong Kong.

To have trustworthy hands helping in business, David involved his sons in his enterprises.

The later part of Shaul's speech included a presentation/ slideshow of pictures he had taken which included the legacy and the contribution of David Sassoon in Bombay and Pune. David Sassoon spent 32 years of his life in Bombay, these years were an essential landmark in the establishment of the Baghdadi Jewish community in the city.

Besides being one of the most successful business magnates, Sassoon was also a keen philanthropist, who channelled much of his surplus fortune towards helping his brethren and the general population of Bombay as well.

Kutumbakam which means living without any biases in the world. Having toured Brazil and tried the cuisine there, Vedant sees himself as a more confident, independent, friendly and aspiring individual. He plans to go to the University of São Paulo that he had visited while he was in Brazil.

URBAN HERITAGE AT ASIATIC LIBRARY, MUMBAI

The Urban Heritage Committee of the Rotary Club of Bombay was formed three years ago as a result of a deep interest in conserving the historical and cultural heritage of Mumbai


IT WAS FITTING THAT THE COMMITTEE focussed on the Asiatic Library as its first major project. The library, a seat of learning established in 1804, has been housed since its inception within the imposing Town Hall, Mumbai's iconic landmark.

The Asiatic Library is a repository of ancient books, manuscripts, maps, coins and artefacts. Its archives and holdings are a treasure trove, which includes a rare copy of Dante's *Divine Comedy* (one of only two illustrated copies in existence), old coins of Ashoka's reign and rare Buddhist relics.

The library also encourages and disseminates research. It offers a forum for public debate on critical issues, organises lectures and exhibitions.

Sadly, over the last several years, the collections have deteriorated due to lack of funding and infrastructure. Despite being such an important part of the city's heritage, lack of knowledge and general apathy have led to disengagement. And although the Town Hall is such a familiar and well-loved landmark for Mumbaikars, few have entered its portals.

The Society's holdings include over 3,000 manuscripts in Sanskrit, Arabic, Persian, Urdu and Prakrit from all over India and Nepal. They are mostly on paper, but some are on palm leaf. They include technical literature on linguistics, medicine, astronomy, Jaina and other Brahmanical literature in Sanskrit, an appendix on Buddhist manuscripts, Jaina literature and manuscripts in Gujarati, Hindi and Marathi. Apart from the variety of topics covered, some of the manuscripts are distinguished for their fine calligraphy and paintings. The latest addition to the manuscript collection is the entire work of Pu La Deshpande donated by him.



What has been accomplished

CONSERVATION LABORATORY

One of the first goals undertaken by Rotary's Urban Heritage Committee was to renovate the Conservation Laboratory so that rare and irreplaceable books could be restored. This new facility enables hundreds of books to be restored and, thereafter, digitised, every year.

ADOPT-A-BOOK

The Committee has initiated a book sponsorship programme whereby individuals and corporates provide the funds to adopt, restore and digitise a specific number of books.

MAP PRESERVATION

A source of particular concern was the manner in which ancient maps, many of them hand drawn, were being stored in damp basements. Steel cabinets have been provided to store them properly and protect them from further climatic deterioration.

UPGRADING SERVICES & FACILITIES

The committee co-sponsors the housekeeping and maintenance of library facilities to provide a better environment for staff and visitors. Work is in progress to install WiFi and to enhance the Asiatic's website and social media presence.

ORGANISING CULTURAL EVENTS

It is important to attract more visitors to the Asiatic and Town Hall in order to make the institution once more relevant to the city. Toward this end, various well-attended functions have been organised by the Rotary Club of Bombay. These include a dance performance, several plays, lectures and cultural events.

The strategy is two-fold: to increase its membership and activities, and to create sources of revenue for the institution.
