

# IS THE COUNTRY'S FUTURE BRIGHT?

The last meeting of Rotary year 2018-19 with President Rtn Vijay Kumar Jatia was one to remember as it not only marked the attendance of 218 Rotarians and guests but also welcomed the Club's 12th Honorary Rotarian, Uday Kotak.

Later, Uday shared his thoughts with the Club on: 'What India will look like in 2025'. The talk was a melting pot of all the aspects that constitute India — cricket, Where will we stand in six years time? Last Tuesday's speaker, Hon. Rtn. UDAY KOTAK, takes a closer look



Indian music, food, education, Bollywood sports and, finally, its economy.

"This is cricket season, and we are in the middle of 2019 ICC World Cup. Most of us believe India will make it. My subject today is: What India will be in the year 2025. Between now and 2025, will come another World Cup, in 2024. So I start with this concept of cricket, a remnant of the British Empire."

"A couple of weeks ago, I was

at a dinner with the family of the US Consul General, Edgard Kagan. To my astonishment, his 12-year-old son, Daniel is passionate about cricket and as good as any expert on it. So, what I would like to think is, that, the 2024 World Cup should participation from big players like US and China and India should beat them all."

My first dream of 2025 is of India as world champion in cricket with the best of countries playing alongside them."

"The true measure of a country's progress is not just hard power. While hard power is important for its sheer ability to dominate the world, to become truly world class it is important to have soft power. This brings to mind the phenomenal victory we had with the Modi Government coming back to power with a strong endorsement by the people of India. India has a lot of muscular ability in handling the hardware of its future. What is also crucial for the development of a world power is the development of software."

"I would love to see India out there in the area of music. What are we doing to make Indian music recognisable across the world and heard everywhere? What are we doing with reference to food? Bloomberg has published a list of the top 10 restaurants in Mumbai. Of course, Sea Lounge is in this list but Swati Snacks is there too. Vijay was thoughtful enough to organise food from Swati Snacks today. Therefore, soft power is not just about GDP. It is about leadership in thought, and in the way human minds think. I would love to see India, between now and 2025, leading in music, food and education."

"What are we doing to develop Indian education and make it world class? Why do so many of our kids want to go to the US to study or to Canada? What are we doing to not just keep them here but also import the global community into our schools and colleges? This is the change I would like to see in India between now and 2025."

"Once, while talking to the Deputy Prime Minister of Singapore, I asked, as it was a small country, what made it unique? He said that it was because Singapore is a small country that they did not believe in averages. He said, 'We believe in peaks in each area of focus. If we are average, why would anyone take Singapore seriously? He may as well go to a Jaipur or a Rajkot.' So what are we doing to make our cities, towns and activities at the peak rather than being satisfied with averages?

"India deals with a large number of people who are even below the average, therefore while we work on getting these people towards the average, the true success of our country will be when we start capturing peaks and being outstanding in areas of excellence. This is related to our hardware as well. Take the case of China versus India: On hard facts, India is so much behind China and therefore, for us to take over China in addition to hard facts, we will need soft power."

"India's Bollywood is our software power. It is that cutting edge which is sidestepping the ability of the hard guys and moving forward to take leadership position and, in the bargain, creating new, innovative jobs in the future as well. The future of jobs is going to be in leisure, arts, sports and other areas which we traditionally do not connect with jobs."

"My family is now into an interesting sport called kabaddi; it is a very Indian sport. Many players in rural India whose annual income used to be Rs 50 to 60,000 a year, now make closer to a crore a year because kabaddi as a sport has developed and it is encouraging people to get in to this sport across the length and breadth of the country. Therefore, the power of creating multiple avenues beyond traditional thinking of business is crucial for India to become a world class country in the coming years."



"In that context, just to give some facts about China, India's per capita GDP today is over \$2,000 while China is at nearly \$10,000 per individual. If India has to get to where China's per individual income is, it has to grow close to 10 per cent for the next 20 years. It is an uphill battle and we need to find interesting ways to getting around this to have a truly developing country. In this context, I would like to specifically mention two important points our Prime Minister made recently, post-Elections, 'Sab ka saath, sab ka vikaas' and most importantly, 'Sab ka vishwaas'. I think these are crucial for our future."

"How do each of us build trust? There is significant trust deficit between the world of business and government. I also wear another hat, as president designate of the CII and one of the most significant objectives that we have laid down is how to bridge this gap."

"The future is going to be about clean governance and clean business. I also embrace the phrase 'Ease of Living' beyond ease of

doing business. The Prime Minister has said it and there is a merit to it. This in, many ways, tied with the business of hardware and software of how we build our country. Therefore, combining *Saath, Vikaas, Vishwaas* and Ease of living is where our future is. I would like to see this development between now and 2025."

"It is here that I must compliment institutions like Rotary. My father shared with me the six areas of focus to make a difference to India. Whether we get ahead of China or not in GDP is a matter of debate but I would love to see an India which is a combination of high quality of power with ease of living, trust and progress. This is what we must all work towards."

"In that context, there is another interesting development in front of: a new wave of nationalism has become the fashion around the world. In this world of Vladimir Putin, Xi JinPing and Donald Trump, we have to rework and rewrite the rules of engagement. Particularly in the context of business and finance, we need to move to a significant domestic capacity building where we are able to sustain ourselves if a Trump tweets something

and decides to ban imports or ban Nostro accounts to India. How self-resilient are we, to be able to withstand shocks of power? How ready is India to have that capability? This is not an easy battle. We are not in the big league of battles. The big league of battles is between China and the US at the front and maybe Russia after that. Irrespective of how we feel about our position in the world, we are significantly behind these three in the global power game."

"We need to build our capacity in each segment of activities. I am not being protectionist; I welcome foreign capital. But that cannot be instead of us building our own capacity and capability. I would love to see India, in 2025, say that we have these areas of excellence, we have been able to change the lives of millions of Indians and we are proud about ourselves as a race which is transforming the world."

#### **ROTARIAN QUESTIONS**

How do you think will the dispute between the US and China pan out? What is India's role? Can we take advantage or not?

In many ways, China is ahead of the US. What China did was that right in front of the eyes of the US, it did not allow Google, Facebook or any of the others enter China. They built their own domestic companies, be it an Alibaba or others. They have become global powers and, at the same time, they have kept these big boys out.

Today, the US is now recognising that this trade war with China is also a war over control of future technology. Future technology is also going to control military power and this is a much bigger strategic battle between these two countries.

The US kept its markets open, allowed China to export by underpricing factors of production and accumulating huge reserves. This is going to be a huge global issue in the years to come and whatever one's views maybe on Donald Trump, most American businesses agree with what he is doing vis-a-vis China.

For us, as India, we need to have a good relationship with the US as well as with Japan. But from the point of view of geography, our neighbour is China. So, our ability to manage this huge elephant next door is going to be a huge challenge because it has a much greater ambition to spread itself. Therefore, this battle between the US and China is god-sent for India because it, at least, gives us some manoeuvre in our relations with China.

# What do you expect on July 5th (budget)?

The new government is wellintentioned but there is an important message shared by the Prime Minister that will flow through the budget. There are only two castes in India: one is the poor and the other is the one which does more and more for the poor. Therefore, the budget is going to be directionally consistent with this fundamental philosophy. As a citizen of India, while I have no issue with the philosophy, we need to ensure a better distribution of the cake. We should keep in mind that the growing of the cake is as important as its distribution. I also hope that the budget, while focusing on the distribution of the cake, gets the Indian entrepreneurial spirit back in a big way to invest more.

What are your views on the Hong Kong demonstrations by people?

In this era, where most powers of the world desire hard power, the people of Hong Kong have demonstrated that they care for their freedom.

For the people of Hong Kong to step up and say this to the dictatorial Chinese authorities is a very welcome development.

# Any view on the NBFCs and banking, structural changes?

I think we should divide it into two parts, one in which the NBFCs have issues of solvency and/or governance. The second issue is of liquidity. Right now, there is an attempt in some quarters to bring up the liquidity issue to what may be actually solvency or a deep governance issue.

How do you think education should be remodelled or revolutionised to cope with the position we are taking



#### on?

I love engineers so we should ensure we have world-class engineers. We need to have education of liberal arts and India needs to create and encourage the culture of free thinking, the kind that the US has done. There are many universities who have made significant progress in this direction, in addition to engineering as well. But let us create an inclusive civil society.

If India is to become a \$5 billion dollar economy, financing is the most important thing. What is your view that there is a little mistrust between PSU banks and people who want money

#### (Indian entrepreneurs)?

We need to create new venture capital so that equity is available to entrepreneurs in addition to their own capital. On the issue of bank financing, some society change is required:

1. We would love to see companies come to us with honest balance sheets.

2. We should be able to trust audited signatures, however small or big the firm.

3. The number should be real.

4. The industry of valuers should act responsible; there is a huge valuation profession available.

So, we would like to give our money but sometimes we would like to get that money back too. Quick Read: Anand Mahindra and Uday Kotak were inducted as Honorary Rotarians this year. # Details of patients treated from July 2018 to May 2019:

Our resident medical officer (M.O.) Dr. Ashwini Bhusara takes care of patients with general health problems. 15,194 patients were examined and medicated. She visits the centre twice a day, six days a week.

Besides Dr. Bhusara, ADMC has different specialists visiting the centre on Sundays.

First Sunday of the month team is led by Rtn. (Dr.) Rohini Chougule for TB, COPD; sickle cell anaemia etc. 601 patients were examined and given medication as required and subsequently followed up.

Second and third Sunday team consisting of Dr. Srinivas Kamath, Dr. Ajay Gupta and Dr. Neeraj Kolgealong with Rotaractors of Government Dental College (GDC) and Rotarians of the ADMC Committee.

1020 patients were examined and treated for fillings, root canal treatment, X-rays, prophylaxis (cleaning), extractions and replacement of missing teeth.

Fourth Sunday visit by paediatrician Dr. Bijoy Apte who attends to children visiting the centre. 324 patients were seen by him and advised medication. Each Sunday and certain Saturdays, there is a pathology technician who collects samples from patients and submits a report to referring doctors from PRVEC and ADMC. 1050 samples were collected.

All the services rendered at ADMC were free of cost to 18,189 patients treated from July 2018 to May 2019.

The above routine will continue each month for the rest of the year.

Good work is being carried out at ADMC. New Rotarians should be encouraged to pay a visit to Talwada and appreciate the work being done by our Club. Quick Read: 18,189 patients were treated free of cost at ADMC, Talwada, from July 2018 to May 2019. CSMVS houses an outstanding collection of 50,000 artefacts. The up-gradation to CSMVS will save 60 per cent energy over traditional lighting facade.

#### **1st Project**

Talk by Swami Swatmananda of Chimaya Mission. Swami was invited by RCB to give a talk on September 4<sup>th</sup>, 2018, on: Sensitizing people towards environmental responsibilities.

#### **2nd Project**

Environment-friendly, energysaving façade and landscape lighting at the CSMVS museum. This is in tandem with an already installed solar plant by RCB upon the same premise.

CSMVS is a Grade I Heritage Building of the city housing about 50,000 artefacts with an outstanding collection.

The environment-friendly energy-saving cold light source and its advantages:

Save 60 per cent energy over traditional façade lighting.

Reduce carbon footprint reduction in environment.

Low sky glow and light trespass which help to reduce light pollution.

Modular solution with scalability help to give flexibility in installation and reduce damage to monument while installation. Helps to restore the Grade I Heritage Building.

LED lights with zero UV and IR component help preserve



the monument's structure and its life.

LED lights attract fewer insects and flies when on in outdoor installation and safe for insects.

Solar resource with net zero concepts in selective area can be considered to reduce load.

Future upgradability.

The CSMVS museum has been issued a Platinum Certification (the highest on the sustainable practices rating scale) from the IGBC (Indian Green Building Council).

It is a certification issued to public buildings that develop sustainable practices and solutions to reduce negative environmental impacts.

> While the LEED certification is en route, RCB has also been instrumental in installing an additional 35 KW of solar panels within the museum premises.

This has brought down the energy consumption down by an additional 9.3 per cent. The Club also helped increase the rainwater harvesting capacity of the site from 10,000 litre to 40,500 litre, aiming to make the institution self-sustaining.

The Club proposed a sewage treatment plant to make optimum use of the water drained into the sink to maintain the building's gardens and lawns.

#### **Status Report:**

#### 1. Jal Jeevan inaugurates 12 projects in Vidarbha region of Maharashtra

Rotary Club of Bombay's Water Resources Committee inaugurated installation of seven RO plants, one UV plant and distributed a total of 879 gravity-based filters in four villages in the Vidarbha region of Maharashtra. These were done as a part of the Jal Jeevan Initiative where safe drinking water is provided to the villages, benefiting them with better health and improving their economic condition. Two teams from the Club comprising PP Rtn. Sandip Agarwalla, Rtn. Vineet Suchanti, Rtn. Bimal Mehta and Rtn. Abhishek Saraf, along with a personnel from Eureka Forbes, travelled to each of the villages from April 10 to 12, 2019, to ensure that the plants are installed and will benefit over 12,000



to train them to run and operate the water purification plant on a day-to-day basis.

adults and children in villages by providing them with a constant supply of safe and clean, drinking water.

RO plants in seven villages: Mandwa, Shivani (Yavatmal), Zarandi (Akola), Shivangaon, Fattepur, Pimpal gaon Behani (Amravati), Khadka (Wardha).

UV Plant at one village: Wai

(Wardha).

Gravity filters in four villages: Karanji, Tapona (Yavatmal), Wadgaon Patan, Gorala (Amravati).

This marks completion of the first phase of the project encompassing a total of 42 villages which the Rotary Club of Bombay proposes to complete. The project envisaged a need assessment, testing of water at each of the villages, evaluation of the right equipment that will sustain in each location and finally making sure that the plants are installed in appropriate sheds and training is provided to the villagers to operate and maintain the plants on an ongoing basis. In villages where the RO plant could not be installed due to infrastructure or non-availability of consistent source of electricity or raw water, gravity-based filters have been given to every household. A comprehensive maintenance for a period of three years has also been provided for each of the plants. The projects were done under a cooperation agreement and participation with Eureka Forbes along with ground level assistance from NGO AVGSS. For the second and third phase, we have received the Global Grant approval for US\$ 145,000.

The second phase of the project covering 16 villages is under implementation and is proposed to be completed by the end of June 2019.

#### 2. Rural Project – Jalna Clean Drinking Water

Water Resources Committee has also taken up a project to provide clean drinking water and water stewardship to villages in the Jalna area of interior Maharashtra. This is to be executed in a phasewise manner in partnership with Eureka Forbes, Watershed Organisation Trust (WOTR – a not-forprofit NGO recognised widely Quick Read: Hermes has committed INR 34,00,000 to conserving 90-120 maps at The Asiatic Library over a period of two years. as a premier institution in the field of Watershed **Development Its unique** strength lies in its on-field experience), the Gram Panchayat and the Rotary Club of Jalna. Activities proposed are to provide the community with safe drinking water, repair and construct wells, construct storage tanks, advocacy for water management and improving general cleanliness of the village. Ten villages were identified and the water quality was tested to determine the type of purification treatment required. A field visit was made by RCB President Vijay Jatia, PP Rtn. Sandip Agarwalla, Rtn. Abhinav Aggarwal as also Rotaractors from Rotaract Club of HR College. We were joined by representatives of Eureka Forbes and WOTR and were graciously hosted by donor Raju Barwale and the Rotary Club of Jalna. It was decided to initiate work on four villages as Phase I for providing safe drinking water and in 10 villages for providing water stewardship training. The balance six villages will also be provided safe drinking water plants and facilities shortly. A donor has been identified who has contributed a sum of Rs. 50 lakh.

Phase 1 of the project is expected to be completed by the end of June 2019.

Adarshnagar and Sathenagar plants relocated to Dongripada & Manor schools

Despite arduous efforts and persistent visits by our members, we have reached





the conclusion that rather than waste our precious resource and have the plant grossly underutilised at Sathenagar due to extraneous factors, it would better serve the community if it was shifted. This is a result of water being now made available through new pipelines laid by the municipal corporation. As regards the Adarshnagar plant, we have run into issues with the self-help group backing out due to local elements as well as water now being made available in that area again by the Municipal Corporation. Hence it is difficult to put up the plant in that locality. Since both these projects were under a Global Grant, we have received the formal approval from The Rotary Foundation to relocate the plants as follows:

#### 3. Jal Jeevan at Yusuf Meherally Vidyalaya, Tardeo, Mumbai

Water Resources Committee of Rotary Club of Bombay

inaugurated yet another Jal Jeevan safe, drinking water facility at the Yusuf Meherally Vidyalaya at Tardeo, Mumbai, on March 25<sup>th</sup>, 2019. YMV is a co-educational Marathi medium school established in 1963. It provides an opportunity to children from lower income groups to study practically free. More than 330 students and faculty members are expected to benefit from this facility on a daily basis.

The inauguration was done at the hands of Moti Saraf (father of our Rtn. Abhishek Saraf), and President of RCB Vijay Jatia. In attendance were Rtn. Vineet Suchanti, PP. Rtn. Sandip Agarwalla, PP. Rtn. Paul George, Rtn. Abhishek Saraf, Mr Ashok Chhabria, Secretary of Yusuf Meherally Education Society Vijaya Chauhan and Principal of the school Mr. Chaudhary along with the students and faculty members.

#### 4. Safe Drinking Water Facility at Malabar Hill Post

Office, Mumbai

The Water Resources Committee of Rotary Club of Bombay has installed an UV based Safe Drinking Water plant at the Malabar Hill Post Office. The equipment was supplied by Eureka Forbes Limited and is inclusive of warranty for one year and maintenance for an additional two years. The installation will benefit over 100 postal employees, all BEST staff (depot across the road) as well as the public visiting Hanging Gardens by providing safe, clean and cool drinking water. The workers and staff at the Post Office welcomed this initiative especially considering that summer is around the corner and they will have access to cool and clean drinking water. The plant was inaugurated by President Vijay Jatia on March 11<sup>th</sup>, 2019.



#### NEW INITIATIVES 2018-19 SAFE DRINKING WATER: JALNA AND AURANGABAD (VILLAGE CLUSTERS)

Watershed Organisation Trust (WOTR) is a globally recognised organization dedicated to transforming the lives of millions across India in participatory watershed development and ecosystems restoration, adaptive sustainable agriculture, integrated and efficient water management, and climate change adaptation, with a special emphasis on vulnerable communities, farmers, and women.

WOTR works across thirteen different areas, using applied research to help rural communities reduce their



vulnerabilities to climatic and non-climatic risks. It organizes them in a socially and gender inclusive manner to help themselves out of poverty.

Since inception in 1993, WOTR has restored over 8,913 sq. km of degraded land and its schemes have directly and indirectly benefited 1.4 million people. Over 385,000 people across the country and 63 countries have participated in WOTR's training and capacity building programmes.

Together with WOTR, a

renowned NGO in the space of watershed management, we will be providing safe drinking water to a cluster of villages in the Districts of Jalna and Aurangabad.

The approximate cost per project is Rs.1.25 crore each, totally Rs.2.5 crore.

Quick Read: Up to 100 surgeries for needy children will be provided by leading hospitals in this year at zero cost to the beneficiaries. The average cost per surgery is approximately Rs. 2 lakh. Training teachers in Thane's schools is expected to benefit more than 24,000 students.

#### ORTHOPAEDIC OT

This includes surgeries of various orthopaedic treatments such as hand, shoulder & elbow surgery, total joint reconstruction, skull reconstruction, paediatric orthopaedics, foot & ankle surgery, spine surgery, surgical sports medicine, orthopaedic trauma. The approximate cost of this is Rs. 1,13,00,000.

#### CARDIAC OT

To treat complications of ischemic heart disease, to correct congenital heart disease; or to treat valvular heart disease from various causes, including endocarditis, rheumatic heart disease and atherosclerosis along with heart transplantation. The approximate cost of this is Rs. 2,47,00,000.

#### ENT OT

Removal of Superficial Skin Cancers, Tonsillectomy / Adenoidectomy, PE Tubes (Myringotomy), Nasal Septum Surgery, Sinus Surgery, Tympanoplasty. The approximate cost of this is Rs.1,15,00,000.

#### PLASTIC SURGERY & COSMETICS DEPARTMENT EQUIPMENT

Ablative lasers for removal of small tumours, warts,

skin tags, xanthomas, Non Ablative lasers for scar excision, keloids and hypertrophic scars, stretch marks, Intense pulse light for hair removal, acne, vascular lesions, pigmented lesions, birth marks, tattoos can be removed along with rejuvenation of the face. The approximate cost of this is Rs. 31,00,000.

#### EQUIPMENT RELATING TO DEEP BRAIN STIMULATION SURGERY FOR MOVEMENT DISORDERS

This involves the implantation of a medical device called a neuro-stimulator, which sends electrical impulses, through implanted electrodes, to specific targets in the brain (brain nuclei) for the treatment of movement and neuropsychiatric disorders. The approximate cost of this is Rs. 2,25,00,000.

#### ENDOSCOPY UNIT The approximate cost of this is Rs. 72,00,000.

#### OPD DIGITAL EMR PROJECT

This is a software-based solution to provide a paperless OPD i.e. Digitalisation of OPD and for ease of use of pre-designed customisable templates. The approximate cost of this is Rs. 6,72,000.

#### **BURNS DEPARTMENT**

Masina Hospital is well known for Burns & Plastic surgery department & services and to increase facilities we provide & upgrade the machines from time to time. Approx cost: this is Rs. 41,00,000

#### PAEDIATRIC & NEONATAL DEPARTMENT

#### Police health check-up

RCB organised a series of medical camps for Maharashtra Police's junior officers and constables. Under the leadership of President Vijay Jatia, guidance of PP Rtn. Sandip Agarwalla and consultation with Additional Director General Police, Sanjay Saxena, the camp will be conducted in staggered phases in May and June 2019.

About a hundred personnel from the Police Training Center Khandala and 500 personnel from Police Training Center Marol will benefit from the drive. Rtn. (Dr.) Indumati Gopinathan from Thyrocare and Rtn. Rahil Shah of NM Medical are extending their services and good support to ensure the drive will be successful. Given the hectic schedule of the police force, a regular medical check-up is a must for their overall well being. Rotary Club of Bombay is happy to partner with Mumbai Police for their good health.

Police personnel will undergo tests to detect liver, kidney, heart and diabetes ailments. ECG, 2D Echo, Chest X-Ray, PAP Smear, gynaecological, dental and basic consultation will be performed on select groups.

The first of these was held on May 26th, 2019 at the NM



Medical Centre, Vashi and Mulund. A total of hundred senior officers and 500 constables was examined.

#### **E-Learning**

Rotary India Literacy Mission has appeared in the literacy scenario of Washim district with 90 e-learning kits funded by SBI Foundation and supported by RI District 3030, RC Bombay and RC Navi Mumbai (Industrial Area), for Zilla Parishad schools. This time, they are digitising a total of 90 schools, 65 in Washim and 25 in Mumbai. Kits have been distributed to all the headmasters and teachers after preliminary training in hardware and software usage.

RILM had received 100 per cent fund support from ONGC for installing e-learning facilities in 75 schools in Maharashtra. Out of these, 50 schools are in Mumbai (RID 3141) and 25 schools in Thane (RID 3142), respectively. School lists have been shared with ONGC. The e-learning

The kit includes 32" LED TV along with an android box and software content via the DIKSHA App with a total unit cost of Rs 20,390. This is an excellent opportunity for the district/ club which will benefit more than 20,000 children in Government schools in the state of Maharashtra.

#### **Kerala Relief Fund**

A detailed survey and requirement of the hospitals was done in Kerala with the help of YMCA. Equipment was donated on the basis of that. Approximately Rs 52 lakh was spent on relief equipment to two hospitals. Equipment was donated to Shree Narayana Institute of Medical Sciences and St. Thomas Hospital.



Quick Read: KERALA RELIEF FUND: A detailed survey and requirement of the hospitals was done in Kerala with the help of YMCA. On the basis on requirement and survey done, the following projects were approved. 90 schools have been digitised in Washim and Mumbai as per the Rotary India Literacy Mission. 20,000 students are expected to benefit from this programme.


