





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NOTE FROM PRESIDENT SHERNAZ VAKIL



Today I stand upon the shoulders of many stalwarts before me. Presidents who have not only made the Bombay Club what it is today but also lead with moral authority and conviction. How can we continue with the same values

- the values that make a true Rotarian - in a world that has become all about the prestige of wealth?

Then, a conversation that DGE Sandip Agarwalla had with Dean of Harvard Business School Nitin Nohria about moral humility was an epiphany. A spotlight on morality in the world today and the core values that should be guiding us and it turns out that a Rotarian's 4-way test with its emphasis on truth and fairness, goodwill and friendship, and a concern for the well-being of all, is the best moral compass we can follow.

This past year has been devastating to so many in our communities and we, at the Rotary, have shown great compassion and altruism in reaching out to them. Thank you, Framroze, for your patient and collected approach to resolving problems and navigating a way through such uncharted waters. The Rotary Club of Bombay is indebted to you and your team for supporting all our projects through these trying times.


I would now like to congratulate our incoming team, the Board, and the Chairs, who have so willingly agreed to commit and work towards a special and meaningful year. I know the teams we have formed this year to lead and support the Club will have the moral humility and authority to work in a true spirit of integrity and purpose.

Today, the need for service is more compelling and more urgent. We will step up and work together to bring change in the lives of those marginalised by circumstances. We hope to work with a sense of engagement, meaning and strength of purpose and to support under-served communities.

This year, we do not have many new big-bang projects but continue to refine and serve some of the very worthy projects of this Club, by revisiting their original mandate, and seeing if we can tackle them more cost-effectively.

We have once again met with each of the NGOs that have supported us and without whom we could never have accomplished the reach and service we have. Together, we are looking at ways to be more cost-effective while balancing the needs of the projects with the resources available.

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This year, Environment has been declared a new and major thrust area for Rotary International, and we hope to make maximum impact in this area. We plan to take up the development of an entire Gram Panchayat consisting of three villages where we would bring about sustainable transformation to the area and catapult the villagers outofpoverty. Through this integrated village development initiative, we pivot solar power to provide clean green energy and water to the community impacting all facets of their life and livelihoods. Over 2000 villagers from 340 households in the Nilmati-Dandwal Gram Panchayat will be impacted.

We will try and involve our Rotaractors to propel our projects forward with their youth and enthusiasm.

Twelve years ago, our Club launched the widely-acclaimed Bhavishya Yaan programme aimed at making underprivileged children from our Municipal schools employable. It has done its job rather well. Now, I am pleased to announce what we call BY 2.0. An immersive, three-year, eight-module programme that will bring the knowledge of data analysis, artificial intelligence, and 3D printing to one Bhavishya Yaan school. In a world driven by technology our objective this time is to create a group of solution-oriented employees who will contribute to building the India of tomorrow.

Join us on this historic journey.

A new initiative that we plan is in the Rotary area of Peace and Conflict Resolution. The pandemic has revealed the inequalities in our communities and the need to come together to support and heal. We wish to start a new Peace Project initiative at our BMC schools called YAY Zindagee



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which will transform the values and attitudes of the participating children by enhancing their conflict resolution and problem-solving abilities, and focus on the core principles of peace, social justice, and thoughtful action.

We hope that by teaching our kids the need to value each other as humans first, we may be able to instill a sense of unity in the new generation. In addition, we are starting a mentoring centre, where our enthusiastic youngsters can be led into a more meaningful and employable future.

Bright and well deserving children from the 11th and 12th standards who aspire for professional and highly competitive degree courses will get part financial aid and assistance in joining online tutorial classes, to enable them to meet the demanding needs of further studies. This will be enabled through our tie-up with the Yasham Foundation.

To begin with, both these initiatives will start with our BY students as well as in the localities we serve, and hopefully expand in years to come to other youth.

Our special focus will be on the girl child, ensuring she has access to counselling, scholarships, and an economically-viable future. I know this is a project after your heart, RIP Shekhar, and I hope to follow it with passion. I, too, believe that when you empower a girl child through education, you empower humanity at large.

Talwada has always been close to our hearts for the specialised medical services we provide to the community.

This past Rotary year, we may not have been able to reach out to as many people as we would have liked to, but our Rotarian doctors continue to visit and support those who come to the Centre.

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Both ADMC and the PRVEC are due for major repair which is being initiated presently. In fact, a need assessment study is being carried out to understand how we can better serve the community in these trying times. Talwada will always remain our Kohinoor initiative.

Our initiatives for child welfare, and the elderly will continue to operate in a safe and virtual way, till the pandemic fades away, and we can support these communities face-to-face as we have been doing over the years.

Our Water Committee will continue its extraordinary reach in providing safe drinking water and wash stations to schools in the rural areas, once again, with a focus to keep the girl child healthy. RCB is partnering with AKAH (Aga Khan Agency for Habitat) to facilitate and construct sanitation facilities, promoting hygienic and sustainable access to water in schools.

The Panchtattva project envisages the adoption of village Gale, Thane, Maharashtra, and its holistic development. In the current year, the committee is developing a curriculum for environment studies for schools for students of standards 8 to 11. In addition, the committee will be planting a forest using the Miyawaki technique at the Mumbai University, Kalina Campus, whilst taking up beautification of the lake and gardens around it.

We, at the Rotary Club of Bombay, have so much influence and power to serve our communities. We are leaders who, together, can bring positive lasting change to so many around us. We need to use this strength to make the changes that are necessary to help those that need our support by giving them the opportunity to help themselves.















All our strategies are aligned to this core value of providing opportunities to those that need it. Our plans are many. Our committees are empowered.

We now need you, our Rotarians, to join a committee where you feel you can make a difference and enjoy the ability to make that difference.

The older Rotarians of our Club, who have remained with us over decades, have added great value to the Club. We have always selected our members carefully, resulting in a particularly good retention rate. However, this past year has been disruptive for many of our members. The digital format has replaced our Tuesday get-together and fellowship, alienating many.

To address this and ease the financial burden on our older Rotarians, the Board has agreed that members of age 75 and above and with 25 years of continuous membership in our club, would be exempt from membership fees. All RI and District dues including magazine charges would continue to be paid.

This and some other measures like capping expenses on installations and introducing a new interactive digital bulletin, will keep our fees relevant to the difficult times. We hope not only to strengthen but grow the membership in our Club, and include the younger generation, with their ideals, and a strong desire to do good in their community.

The Club's focus on supporting and developing women leaders, will continue, as they take on chairs of various committees. We understand and appreciate that we are part of a global organisation that does great work all







over the world with the passion and financial support of individuals and corporations. By contributing to TRF, we are empowering a global force for good. Our members have always been generous, and we hope to accelerate our contributions this year.

The respect our Rotary organisation gets, comes from more than a hundred years of effective and sustainable projects. We, at RCB, are not far behind coming up close to our own centenary.

And, in closing, let us remember the words of Kahlil Gibran who said,

It is well to give when asked, but it is better to give through understanding. Therefore, give now that the season of giving may be yours, and not your inheritors.

She remembers walking to the Bandstand with her nanny, riding on a pony at the Oval Maidan and walking on the promenade at Cuffe Parade... all things of the distant past. She went to Walsingham House School, although the family lived in Churchgate, bussing it daily to her school on Napean Sea Road.

St. Xavier's College followed school, and President Shernaz completed her BA in Industrial Psychology and Economics. It was here that she met to her future husband Firoze. They did not marry till 10 years later, in '81. President Shernaz continued her studies, adding a Master's in Industrial Psychology from Bombay University and an MBA from a business school in Berkeley, USA, after that.

Once back in India, in the '80s, she joined her father's business in the chemical industry, joining Rotary on a whim, upon encouragement from a close friend, Rtn. Zinia Lawyer. In fact, her first trip with Rotary was to Corbett even before she was inducted. At first, it was all about Tuesday lunches with fun and fellowship. In the following years, she joined every Rotary trip from Iceland to Pondicherry to South Korea.

However, it was through leadership positions in various committees that she understood the good work Rotary does and the dedicated time, effort, and funds by all involved. From 2003, when she joined, to now, President Shernaz has chaired several committees from Vocational Service to Public Awards, Senior Citizen, and Programmes, she feels Rotary has allowed her to fulfil her need to help the many disadvantaged people around her.


In the late '80s, she became the Managing Director of Daiichi Karkaria and has been running the chemical company for over 35 years, in several verticals from textiles to paints with a focus today on oilfield chemicals. She has forged several partnerships on the way. President Shernaz made many visits to Japan during the 90s, working on partnerships with Japanese companies. In the late '90s, Dai-ichi Karkaria signed a JV with Baker, the world's second-largest oil field chemical producer. Today, they partner Champion X who are also one of the largest producers of oilfield chemicals servicing fields all over the world.


President Shernaz is happily married to Firoze and they are proud parents to Meher and Jahangir. Meher is married to Matt and has joined Shernaz in the business, while Jahangir runs Indian Oxides and Chemicals which is a serious player in the flame retardant chemical business.

RI President Shekhar Mehta is only the 4th Indian in 115 years to be nominated as the President of Rotary International for the year 2021-22.

RIP Shekhar was born in 1959 in Kolkata India. A keen academician, he graduated from St. Xavier's College, and has the unique combination of Masters in Commerce, a qualified Chartered Accountant, Cost Accountant and Company Secretary.

He heads the Skyline Group engaged in real estate development in different parts





RIP Shekhar joined Rotary in 1985 and has been Chairman of: Strategic Planning Committee of Rotary International, Rotary India Literacy Mission, Rotary Foundation India, Rotary India Centennial Celebrations, and the Rotary India Humanity Foundation.

He served as District Governor in 1999-2000 and was elevated to the Board of Directors of Rotary International for 2011-2013. While serving as Rotary International Director, he helped Rotary add two countries to its fold – Bhutan and Maldives.

Keenly dedicated to service, Shekhar Mehta has led many major service initiatives in India. Some significant initiatives are: Constructing 500 homes for tsunami survivors in the Andaman & Nicobar Islands; Starting the Shelter Kit programme in India which has served about 20 disasters distributing more than 15,000 Shelter Kits helping about 75,000 disaster victims.

RIP Shekhar started the Healing Little Hearts programme – through this he



has got more than 2500 heart surgeries done for children from across India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal & African Countries. He also facilitated for the programme to now become a National Programme.

Conceptualising nationwide T-E-A-C-H, a literacy programme in India having reached out to more than 50,000 schools and 15 million children. T-E-A-C-H is a holistic programme on literacy. Rotary is working on the T-E-A-C-H Programme with the Central Government and many State Governments.

He has been instrumental in setting up 15 eye hospitals across India serving nearly 50,000 eye operations each year. He started a scholarship programme called UDAAN for marginalised children. Over the last 10 years, 1000 scholarships have been given. Responding to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's national call – he has helped set up 6000 rural toilets benefitting 30,000 people.

RIP Shekhar is a motivational speaker. He has spoken at hundreds of events nationally and internationally. His motivation skills are par excellence which has helped raise millions of dollars for The Rotary Foundation.

RIP Shekhar is recipient of the highest awards of Rotary International & The Rotary Foundation: "Service Above Self Award", "The Meritorious Service Award", "Distinguished Service Award".

He will serve as the world leader of 1.2 million Rotarians in 200 countries and geographical areas in the year 2021-2022. Texas is very close to his heart as the Annual Convention of Rotary International in the year 2022 when he would be serving as Rotary International President is scheduled to be held at Houston.

RIP Shekhar is married to Rashi. She is a social worker and is a stage artist having performed in socially relevant plays across India.

His guiding mantra in life is "Service is the rent that we pay for the space we occupy on this earth".

KNOW YOUR ROTARY INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR

RI Director Dr. Mahesh Kotbagi was born into a family of freedom fighters and doctors. His grandfather, who was Mahatma Gandhi's physician, inspired him to combine his professional life with social service.

He is an M.D. in Gynaecology from Pune University. RID Dr. Mahesh was invited to join the Rotary Club of Pune Sports City in 1995 and served as District Governor of RI Dist. 3130 in 2005-06.

He has served as Chairman - GETS -



Governor Elect Training Seminar 2020, Co-Chairman – RILM – Rotary India Literacy Mission, Chairman Technology – Rotary Institute 2020, District Trainer – RI District 3131 and Trustee – Rotary India Humanity Foundation, Chairman GNTS (Governor Nominee Training seminar 2020).

He is a recipient of Rotary's 'Service above self-Award', TRF's 'Citation of Meritorious Service' and the 'Polio Plus Appreciation Award.' RID Dr. Mahesh is a Major Donor Level 3 and Benefactor of the Rotary Foundation.


RID Dr. Mahesh has now been elected to Rotary International's Board of Directors for 2021-23. He also currently serves as: Rotary International Executive Committee Member 2021-22, Rotary International TRF Trustee Liaison representative from RI Board 21-22, Rotary International District Reorganisation/ Bifurcation Committee 2021-24.

RID Dr. Mahesh is happily married to Dr. Amita, a physician. The couple is blessed with two daughters, Dr. Chinmayee, a radiologist and Sana, who is studying in college.

RTN. GULAM A. VAHANVATY

A Trustee (2018-'22) of The Rotary Foundation, Gulam A. Vahanvaty is an alumnus of St. Mary's High School, Byculla and St. Xavier's College, Mumbai. He has also done an MBA from IIM Kolkata.

TRF Trustee Gulam's 'Eureka' moment in Rotary was in 1978 when he was selected as a member of the District 314 Group Study Exchange (GSE) Team to Rotary District 656 in Indiana, U.S.A. In December 1979 he was invited to join the Rotary Club of Bombay Downtown. In 1985-'86,



he was elected to serve as President and in 2002-'03 District Governor (D-3140).

As District Governor, he united the District leaders and Presidents of all Rotary Clubs with a motivating message "Working Together Works". This bonding resulted in a record contribution to TRF in District 3140 of US\$ 654,000, the largest contribution by any Rotary District in India till 2006-2007.


He is currently serving a four-year term as a Trustee of The Rotary Foundation up to 2022. A major donor, he is a recipient of RI's Service Above Self Award and TRF's Citation for Meritorious Service and Distinguished Service Award.

His motto of service encompasses other initiatives. He is a member of the Governing Board of 'Mumbai First'. He is also Trustee of the Mohalla Committee Movement Trust and Public Concern for Governance Trust, both spearheaded by Mumbai's Former Police Commissioner, Julio Ribeiro.

Haseena, his spouse and the love of his life passed into the ages on New Year's Day in 2015. Everybody who knew her affirms that Gulam was blessed to have such a life partner. Their son Zameer is a partner in the family business, which now encompasses diversified ventures. Daughter-in-law, Khatija, granddaughter Sumehra, son-in-law Satpal Brainch, daughter Zahabia and their sons Rishaan and Jaiyaan, are testament to the inclusiveness and understanding of this remarkable individual.

RTN. DR. RAJENDRA AGARWAL

DG Dr. Rajendra Agarwal is an alumnus of the premier institution VJTI from where he completed with distinction his Textile Engineering and has done his Post Graduate Diploma in Business Management. DG Dr. Rajendra has also done a three-year diploma course in Naturopathy. His vocational excellence has helped in the family textile business R. Piyarelall Pvt. Ltd and Suditi Ind. Ltd. Suditi Industries received an award for the second-biggest exporter of knitted



fabrics at the hands of then-Prime Minister of India Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayee.

He joined Rotary in 1992 as a Chartered Member of the Rotary Club of Bombay Queen City. He led the Club as President in 2005-06 and won several awards.

He has held important District positions: Asst. Governor, Dist. Secretary, Coordinator of the Dist. Service Week, Group Avenue Head of the Dist. Governor's six esteemed projects which include Cancer Care, Paediatric Heart Surgeries, Diabetic Care, Railway Station Improvement projects, Swachh Bharat and Holistic Projects.

He is the architect of the Rotary District signing an MOU with the Government of Maharashtra MISSION MUSKAN with then-Chief Minister Devendra Phadnavis for paediatric surgeries to the underprivileged. He has completed 450 heart surgeries in 2016-17 and 1000 surgeries in 2018-19 and more than 2500 surgeries till today. He has also coordinated and helped children in two heart transplants, many liver transplants, cancer surgeries, dialysis etc. He is the recipient of 4 Avenues of Service Award and numerous citations. He has also been honoured for his contributions by organisations other than Rotary.

His wife Archana is a businesswoman and they are blessed with three daughters, Shruti, who is a fashion designer, Twinkle, a successful Investment Advisor and Meha, a well-known entrepreneur in the baking and confectionery business.

DGE SANDIP AGARWALLA

DGESandip Agarwalla is a third-generation Rotarian. He joined the Rotary Club of Bombay at 29, and became its youngest President in its 91-year history, at the age of 41 years. His term is remembered as one with plenty of service activities, fellowship, top-quality speakers and record fundraising. His zeal after completing his term did not diminish.

His work in the District has been as Avenue Chair across a broad spectrum of activities for various District Governors.



He is one of the few to have been asked to head The Rotary Foundation Avenue, twice. He has been the Group Head for TEACH and WinS, Chief Group Avenue Head of TRF and also the District Secretary and Head of Public Image.

He is currently a member of the National Working Group for CSR (Rotary India), Executive Committee Member of the Rotary India CSR National Committee (RICSR) (up to 30.06.2021) and the District Endowment and Major Gifts Coordinator (DEMGC) for RI Dist 3141 (20-21) He is also the Ambassador Coordinator for all India for RAM (Rotarians against Malaria Action Group) - Global, responsible for eradication of malaria on an all-India basis. He has been elected as the District Governor-Elect for 22-23 for RI District 3141.

His business interests include mining of marble and solar energy. He is a member of several reputed professional bodies and a member of Mensa International, a high-IQ Society.

His wife Malini runs a successful fashion accessories business. She is a Past President of the Inner Wheel Club of Bombay and is its ex-Trustee as well. His son Abhimanyu is based in London and married to Priyanka. They have given Malini and Sandip "the joys of their life", Elina, their granddaughter and Kai Bijoy, their grandson. Sandip's daughter Rishika is married to Sanket and lives in USA.
