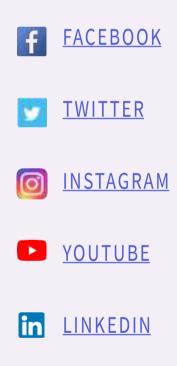

ZIA MODY, CO-FOUNDER AND MANAGING PARTNER OF AZB & PARTNERS, ON THE BENEFITS OF A PROGRESSIVE AND PRO-ACTIVE SUPREME COURT

Today, in the digital and social media space, everything is known about you to everybody. You can't really control what is about yourself, you don't have the right to be forgotten and everything you were and which you thought was personal could be out there. Finally, in 2017, the SC read into the Right to Life as a right to privacy and it is interesting that this judgment was delivered by one of the greatest jurists in the Court, Justice D.Y. Chandrachud who, I think, examined that the older judgment of his father, Y.V. Chandrachud, who was the Chief Justice which did not agree to right to privacy being part of Right to Life and nuanced it and gave it a new meaning and infused it as a part of our Fundamental Right as a Citizen of India.

So, I see the SC as a living, breathing institution in line with the changing requirements of society and, doing what it can in its limited way, does really not have unfettered power in that sense.

It is also constrained by its own limitations under the Constitution. But to strike out wherever it can and make a difference. If you have heard the judgments that the SC has given about the custodial deaths, about requiring states to make sure that people who are in custody do not die unnoticed or unnamed or ignored. They have also given judgments where many of our under-trial prisoners have actually been waiting for the trial for their so-called offence and have been in jail longer than the maximum sentence that they would have received had they gone



to trial and been proved guilty. So, we have a lot of problems as a country but you can always expect our SC to come, face and do whatever it can. The problem, of course, in many of these cases is implementation because the implementation is required to be done by various states and the Central governments, that is not always effective.

The next thing is, of course, technology. How did the SC take steps to protect technology and weave into its freedom of speech? You post so many things on the platform and then suddenly the Government says that the platform owners need to go to jail because they have posted "abusive" or "offensive" content. So, the SC said that this section of the Information Technology Act, Section 66A; we are going to strike down because an intermediary is simply giving you a platform on which you can post. The SC said that the only liability of the intermediary is if there is a Court Order or the intermediary has its own policy of takedown of offensive material and thus intermediary cannot be subjected to this harassment because this itself is a curb on freedom of speech.

Water filtration for Palghar

Rotary Club of Bombay installs water filtration units at Wada and Jawhar

Installation #1:

Wada Rural Hospital, Palghar

No. of beds: 60 and OPD facility

This is a Government Hospital and takes care of the needs of over 50,000 residents of Wada and Vikramgad.

Beneficiaries: Over 700 daily.

RCB has installed one AG Green Pure Chill 120 PSS UV unit with a storage capacity of 120 litre.

Installation #2:

Patangsha Cottage Hospital, Palghar

No. of beds: 100 and OPD facility

This is a Government Hospital and takes care of the needs of over 50,000 residents of Jawhar.



Beneficiaries: Over 1300 daily.

We have installed two AG Green Pure Chill 120 PSS UV unit with storage capacities of 120 litre each. Since a chiller is already installed, which would be used for storage, a filtration unit AG 200 has been attached to the same with a booster pump.

The need assessment was done by Keshav Srushti Gram Vikas Yojana while the technical assessment was done by Eureka Forbes.

Hybrid model of online and offline studies for Ansuyadevi Taparia Junior College: The Ansuyadevi Taparia Junior College located at Talwada, Palghar has yet to receive the required directives from the government to operate as normal. The hostel section is closed till the Government gives its green signal.

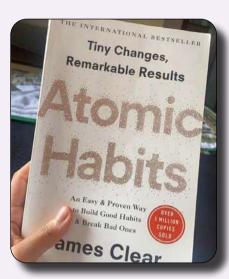
Presently, classes for science and arts, standard 12, are underway and have been so for five weeks with good attendance from nearby students. Those residing far from the college are given online classes by our teachers.

Inspectors at the Jawhar Project Office verify the work of different colleges in the area and report to the Project Officer in real time.

Our aim was to collar dogs with reflective collars which we did for 110 dogs in the Andheri area. The reflective collars prevent night-time canine fatalities as it makes the dogs visible to drivers.

15th, 2021, with the Rotaract Club of Lahore. We played virtual games and went on virtual tours of both countries. We ended the evening with a beautiful live music session. While an Indian singer sang classical songs for them, we, in turn, enjoyed a Sufi night.

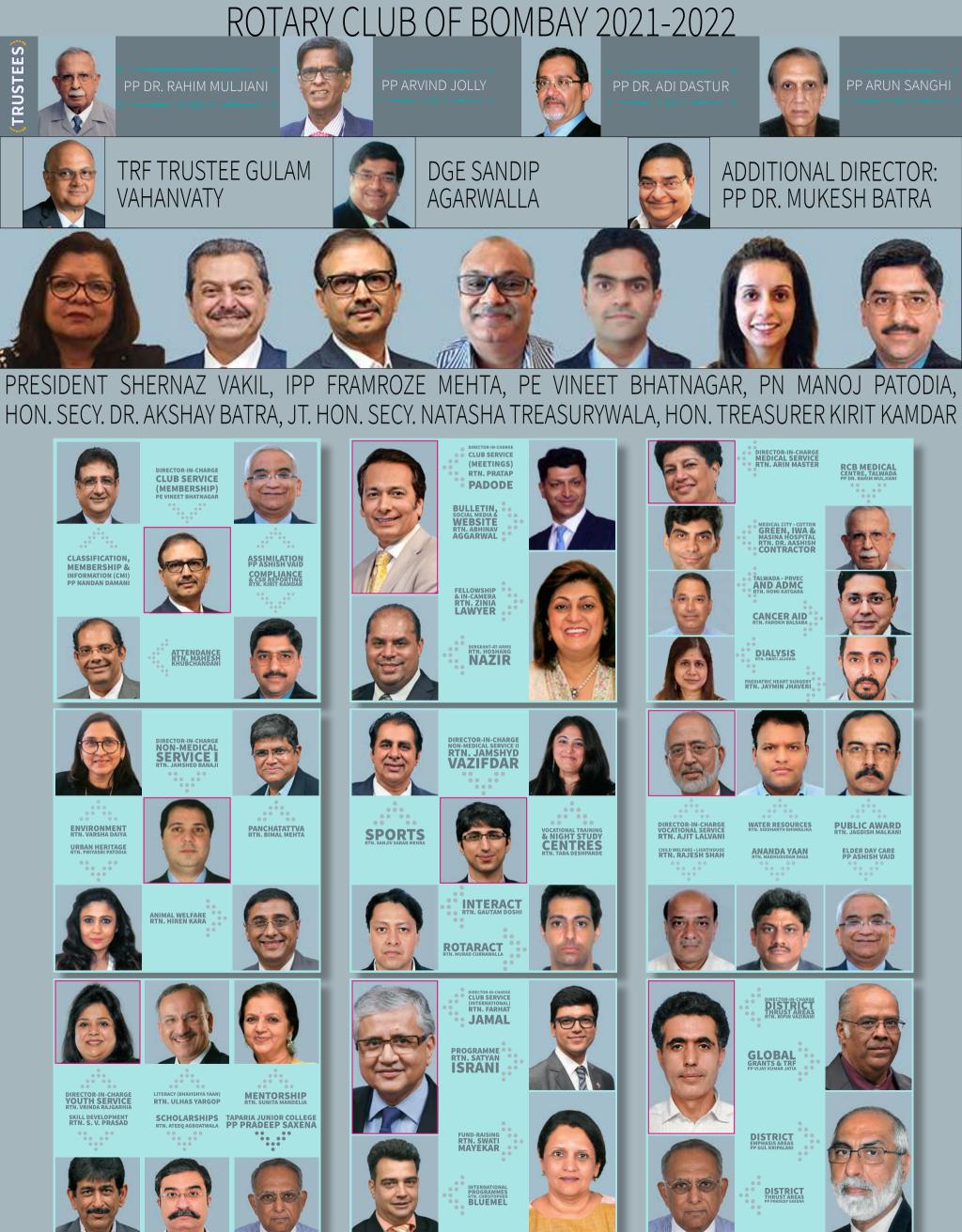
