

THE LOST TRIBE

This week, we post the pathetic stories of the women of the Vaidu community, their desolate and desperate lives, with no hope or meaning, not knowing where the next meal will come from or how they will feed their hungry children that day. How sad is this?

What we would spend on a round of pizza for our kids at one meal... they do not get over three months to feed the family.

When this pathetic situation was brought to our notice, we had to do something to rehabilitate this community. We have started with small steps, feeding a hundred families with ration over the next six months.

I am now looking for Rotarians to adopt one family and feed them over the next year the cost a mere Rs 7000 for rations for a year. This will give them the security that they need to get a hold of their lives and change for the better.

We are also starting adult literacy classes for the women and men to relate to the present world and to be able to carry out a few day-to-day functions that are necessary to participate in the city they live in.

They are a lost tribe forgotten by our fast-paced world, scraping together a meagre existence bringing up a generation of forgotten children. We also plan to teach and motivate the children who have remained unschooled so far... giving them some joy in their unhappy existence with activities and learning.

Further, we are looking at starting vocational training so that this community can find a way to support themselves post the pandemic. Once they are able to learn a small-skill they should be able to make a living and gradually pull themselves out of the darkness and misery.

Rotarians, please read their stories and through their pain let us find a way to help them. ~ President Shernaz Vakil

PRASHANT GADE, FOUNDER, INALI FOUNDATION, RECIPIENT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE AWARD (SSA) FOR RY 2021-22

I started the Inali Foundation in 2015, and it was registered as a non-profit in 2018. We have collaborated with many NGOs and distributed nearly 4000 hands. We have received awards by corporate and industrial bodies across the country.

More than 45,000 people in India lose an arm every year. Nearly 85 per cent of them cannot afford a solution, as **prosthetic arms range from Rs. 8-15 lakhs,** which is unaffordable in a country like India.

My journey began when I met a sevenyear-old girl named Shreya, who was born without her upper limbs. I wanted to give her two prosthetic arms but the company I approached quoted Rs. 24 lakhs, that is, Rs. 12 lakhs per arm.

That's when I decided to give my full time to making affordable, prosthetic arms. My parents were upset and thought I should first earn something for myself, instead of doing something for society. But, for me, I think age was just a number. I had the same thought every single day, that I should do something.

Icameup with a design for an arm but did not have enough money

to make it. So I put the arm on a crowdfunding platform to raise money. It didn't go well but an NGO from Rajasthan saw my crowd-funding initiative and called me to Jaipur. After a three-hour meeting,



they gave me a grant and told me to come back with seven different designs that they could test on their patients.

I created arms in the price range Rs. 50,000 to Rs. one lakh. But every time I went to the director of the NGO, he would say they could not afford it. So, **after six months, I went back to the director with an arm I had made, for \$75.** He was shocked and they decided to give me a hundred patients. Now I had a new problem: how would I make it in bulk?

At around the same time, I received an email from a professor in the US, who had seen my videos on YouTube. He invited me to a conference on bio-medical devices.

I went to the US and shared my story at the conference. I didn't know about Rotary at the time but **some Rotarians attended the conference and gifted me 10 machines to make the arms in bulk.** I came back with the machines, started the Inali Foundation and more than 4000 people have benefitted till date.

From the earliest days of Rotary, members have referred to each other on a firstname basis. Since personal acquaintanceship and friendship are **cornerstones of Rotary,** it was natural that many clubs adopted the practice of setting aside formal titles in conversations among members. Individuals who normally would be addressed as Doctor, Professor, Mister, the Honorable or Sir are regularly called Joe, Bill, Charley or Jerry by other Rotarians. The characteristic Rotary Club name badge fosters the first-name custom.

Club members in Europe use a more formal style in addressing fellow members. Elsewhere, **new Rotarians may be assigned a humorous nickname** which relates to a personal characteristic or which is descriptive of the member's profession. A member nicknamed "Oxygen" is the manufacturer of chemical gas products. "Trees" is the nickname for the Rotarian in the lumber business, "Building" is the contractor, "Paper" is the stationery or office supply retailer. Other members might carry nicknames like "Muscles," "Foghorn" or "Smiles" as commentaries on their physical features. But whether a Rotarian is addressed by a given first name or a nickname, **the spirit of personal friendship is the initial step which opens doors to all other opportunities for service.**




Lighthouse students of standards 3 to 6.



As of part **RCB's outreach** to the Vaidu community to rehabilitate them, rations distributed were to a hundred such needy families in Jogeshwari East areas.

families These living their earn working by as construction site delivery workers, door to persons, salespeople, door vegetable vendors, drainage cleaners, etc.

Before the lockdown, they earned over Rs 6000 to 8000 monthly. Due to the pandemic, their earnings have been reduced to between Rs 3000 to 5000 or less which is not sufficient to meet their requirement.

RCB gave each family a monthly ration kit costing Rs 550 and is committed to doing this for six months.

YALLU PARSHA VARGANTI, 35

Iam HIV positive and have been under treatment for eight years. I



live with my 12-year-old daughter; she attends Mera Sapna where she is learning new things. My husband abandoned us when she was small. We live with my mother. I worked on a construction site but lost my job during lockdown when I fell sick. My family had been starving as there was no income. Thank you for the ration, Rotary Club of Bombay.

SUNITA SURESH SHIVARLU, 35

I am a TB patient, and my condition is worsening. I



work as a housemaid. My husband worked on the construction site, but he lost his job due to lockdown. **He is an alcohol addict.** I have two kids; my daughter is ill, due to lack of protein. We were able to have at least one meal before the pandemic because of my work. But I lost my job and there was no one to look after us. We were starving and worried about our kids but the Rotary Club of Bombay helped us with ration.

TAI SWAMI SHIVARLU, 65

I have three sons and I live with one of them, he is an alcoholic. The



other two live with their families. I did door-to-door selling of small things, but I was not able to do that during lockdown. I started begging on the street, but the police chased us away. It became harder to survive, but I am now able to eat, thanks to the Rotary Club of Bombay. I am thankful to them for helping this old woman.

TAI PRAKASH MELKUNDI, 45

I have five daughters, and one of them is mentally



ill. I collected garbage to earn money. My husband worked as a construction site worker and lost his job in the lockdown. We were unable to get a single meal. Rotary Club of Bombay's ration has helped fill our stomach and I am grateful.

I live with my three kids and husband. He was

S H A R D A P R A L L A D DONGARE, 50

I live with my three kids. My



alcoholic husband left us a few years ago. I worked as a housemaid but lost my job in the pandemic. It was hard to eat a single time. The Rotary Club of Bombay's monthly ration distribution has been a blessing.

DURGAVVA SWAMI MELKUNDI, 67

I am blind in one eye. My two sons left



me years ago. I live on footpath and beg on the street. I was very ill in the lockdown and starving as there was no one to look after me. My blessing to the Rotary Club of Bombay for the monthly ration that now fills my stomach.

BHAGA MANOJ SHIVARLU, 33

I worked as a housemaid and live with my



alcoholic husband and three kids. My husband collected garbage but lost that job due to pandemic. We thank the Rotary Club of Bombay for the ration.


