NAVEEN TAHILYANI, MD & CEO, TATA AIA, ON THE TRANSFORMATION OF TATA AIA WITH A FOCUS ON PEOPLE AND TEAM BUILDING

Last year, we became number one in the life insurance industry. We built a business which is not just high volume but also high quality. Look at how many customers renew the policy they buy with us; our number has increased to 88%. The best in the industry is 89% so, we are not too far away. Our claim settlement ratio is at 98% which is in the top 3 in the industry for the last three years.

We are a very employee-centric company. It is clear to us that whatever we have achieved is backed with hard-work, dedication and loyalty of our employees. We are about 9000 people today as a company and it is because of their contribution that we are where we are.

If I step back now and tell you what worked for us through the last six years of our transformation, we went back to the drawing board and recrafted our vision, mission and values. We said that **if we want to rise, we cannot do what the big boys are doing...** So, what can we do better? That led us to creating a process in which we can issue a protection policy much quicker than almost anybody else.

In 2015, consumers were not clear what they were buying and what returns they would get. So, we were the first in the industry to introduce guaranteed plans ...to do this..., you need to make sure that you are earning a rate of return to bounce back to the consumer. We were the first to work with foreign banks to create

the first derivative instruments in the market which allowed us to do this.


Everything that we have achieved is because of our people. Ultimately, people are at the core. Our attrition rates are by far the lowest and that is a sign that we are doing a few things right.

Lastly, while we have done well with people and on pretty much every metric so far, thanks to our people, we need to innovate for the future through creating an agile organisation. One of the challenges as we have become so large is that we have lost a little bit of our agility. Things which used to take weeks now take months. So, we have got to bring that culture of agility back. We have to have new capabilities linked to our new focus areas of data, analytics and technology and we need to think about how to get these skills in the company. Not just traditional recruiting but working through part-time, consulting and one of the things the pandemic has taught us to do is work from anywhere. So, we are taking advantage of that.

Adopt a dialysis patient







The Rotary Club of Bombay, in association with the Rotary Club of Ghatkopar, has set up a state-of-the-art dialysis centre named Rotary Samarpan Dialysis Centre.

The centre is equipped with 14 high-tech BBraun Haeomodialysis machines.

We appeal to all our members to adopt a dialysis patient to be treated at this centre.

The cost of each dialysis cycle is Rs 900 and on an average a patient has to undergo minimum three cycles a week or 12 cycles a month.

For an economically backward patient, this becomes truly challenging. Each cycle takes nearly four hours and the regular working-class patient's job and thus his/her earning capacity is also impacted. Such patients are unable to access treatment and succumb to this deadly, irreversible disease.

We each have a chance to give a patient a respectable life. We appeal to each and every member to donate generously by adopting a patient.

The treatment cost for each patient would be:

1 week: Rs 2,700; 1 month: Rs 10,800; 3 months: Rs 32,400; 6 months: Rs 64,800; 12 months: Rs 1,29,600

Your generosity could save a patient's life and allow him/her to lead a normal life.

MODA GOA MUSEUM & RESEARCH CENTRE, COLVALE, GOA, INDIA

The museum's collection of over 800 artefacts stretches from the 7th century AD till present date. It includes statues, objects, furniture, photographs and of course costumes, jewellery & accessories.

Casa Dona Maria, as the house was named, is an unregistered heritage house dating to the late 1500's for the ground floor to the mid 1750's to 1850's for the rest of the structure.

After acquisition by the founding Trustee in 1993 (from late Olinda Braganza), various additions were made in the last 25 years keeping in mind the design and constructions techniques of the past.

The restoration being carried out at present is in line with the requirements of world class heritage conservation standards.




The session was informative, interactive, and unique. The event successfully ended throwing light upon sign language for the over hundred participants of the webinar.



Zakia Wardak, Afghanistan's first woman Consul General in Mumbai

Zakia Wardak, Afghanistan's first woman Consul General in Mumbai, was a successful engineer who virtually shuttered her business several years ago to focus on health and women's rights in Afghanistan. Zakia Wardak is the President of the Society of Afghan Women in Engineering and Construction and has a strong passion for Afghan women to excel in the area of governance, human rights, education and entrepreneurial leadership skills.

Her family has been fractured and diminished by long decades of war in Afghanistan. Soviet forces killed her father four decades ago, Americans seized and tortured her husband two decades later and her brother was murdered in the capital this past summer (source: The Guardian).

Wardak is no stranger to Indian culture. In Afghanistan, she grew up amidst Indians, especially Sikhs. When she was appointed last year, Wardak said, there are "no differences between the people of the two countries".

She complimented Bollywood films for doing a good job of promoting Hindi, which is understood by many in Afghanistan. Brought together by Bollywood and cricket, India and Afghanistan have traditionally shared warm and friendly relations in different spheres, India has built around 200 schools there, awards 1,000 scholarships and hosts over 16,000 students here.
