ZAKIA WARDAK, AFGHANISTAN'S FIRST WOMAN CONSUL GENERAL IN MUMBAI, ON

CONNECTING INDIA AND AFGHANISTAN, IN AN INTERVIEW WITH RTN. MANJEET KRIPALANI

How has Afghanistan changed over the years?

A lot of development has taken place in Afghanistan, and we hope it doesn't stop, especially for women. We have a lot of widows due to the war, and many women are suffering. They should be able to be a part of Afghanistan's development and work shoulder-to-shoulder with men. That is all I can say.

lot of We have women a activists, social entrepreneurs, singers, ministers, counsellors, doctors, engineers, and TV anchors, so there is a lot of development. Earlier, women in Afghanistan were not allowed to go to schools and today we have girl students from India who are studying there.

Afghanistan has become a uniquely matriarchal society in many ways because of the many men who lost their lives due to the war. How has that been impacted in the past years?

There were difficulties. We wanted development, but they were struggling.

When women-led families moved to the city, were they able to lead a professional life?

Some could. But I have been living here for a year, and I don't see much development in rural areas even here. Many women don't change, they don't go to school. They don't get educated, they

work as maids, there are a lot of problems.

In Afghanistan, too, four years of war has caused a lot of damage.

Can we talk about the India-Afghan trade and how it has progressed?

Last year, even with the pandemic, we reached US\$ 1.5 billion trade with Afghanistan and India. We aim to raise it to US\$3 to 5 billion. There is a lot of love for the fruits, dry fruits, jaifal and hing of Afghanistan and from India, it is rice, sugar, and cooking oil. These are the three major products that Afghanistan has passion for besides clothing and handicrafts. We also have special stones and Jaipur is the biggest buyer, I guess, and they have invested in Jaipur.

When you look at the trade, is it still continuing?

No matter what kind of government exists, trade will always happen because the Afghanistan people will need to get products from India and also some needful things from Afghanistan will go to India unless the Indian Government announces that they will not trade, which has not happened yet.

A rare copy of Dante's *Divine*Comedy holds pride of place here as does a first folio by Shakespeare himself, dated 1623.

The Asiatic's online sub-portal granthsanjeevani. com has over 20,000 books, newspapers, manuscripts, maps, journals, government publications and reports. Of these, 15,000 are classified as rare and so access to them would not have been possible but for the efforts of the library to preserve them digitally.



Being here was like reliving an era gone by where people would come to this space to read and research from an incredible array of books collected over the past 300-odd years. As we sat in the Darbar Hall and discussed how to help the Asiatic Society and library, it dawned on me that we could have our Club Assembly at this heritage venue.

So, RCB will hold its **first Club Assembly of the year** against the old-world charm of a room conceived many years ago and adorned by the portraits of worthy citizens of yore.

We will also hold **an exclusive map-viewing** of the restored maps for our members at a special function sometime in December.



Adopt a dialysis patient







The Rotary Club of Bombay, in association with the Rotary Club of Ghatkopar, has set up a state-of-the-art dialysis centre named Rotary Samarpan Dialysis Centre.

The centre is equipped with 14 high-tech BBraun Haeomodialysis machines.

We appeal to all our members to adopt a dialysis patient to be treated at this centre.

The cost of each dialysis cycle is Rs 900 and on an average a patient has to undergo minimum three cycles a week or 12 cycles a month.

For an economically backward patient, this becomes truly challenging. Each cycle takes nearly four hours and the regular working-class patient's job and thus his/her earning capacity is also impacted. Such patients are unable to access treatment and succumb to this deadly, irreversible disease.

We each have a chance to give a patient a respectable life. We appeal to each and every member to donate generously by adopting a patient.

The treatment cost for each patient would be:

1 week: Rs 2,700; 1 month: Rs 10,800; 3 months: Rs 32,400; 6 months: Rs 64,800; 12 months: Rs 1,29,600

Your generosity could save a patient's life and allow him/her to lead a normal life.

their understanding of spoken English and comprehension. The second posed questions in geography, science, English and mathematics.


Put together the tokens they earned for their correct answers allowed the children to "purchase" a gift of an equivalent value.

D. Sivanandhan was the Police Commissioner of Mumbai, promoted in the aftermath of the November 2008 Mumbai attacks. He is one of India's most highly regarded officers and retired as the Director General of Police, Maharashtra state in March 2011.

His career spanned multiple high-profile postings over 35 years and he is known for his use of strategy and intelligence to uphold the rule of law. He served as an active member of the special task force in the National Security Council Secretariat, and helped restructure India's internal and external national security provisions.
