GENESIS OF A THREE-YEAR PLAN

Having hunkered down for over 18 months, many of our projects had to be either curtailed or even closed down.

When I took over, we faced a kind of transition period, as one by one our projects restarted in phases. This was and is the perfect time to

reassess our initiatives, reevaluate their scope and understand whether they continued to meet their original mandate. Were we making the same impact? Did our costs and expenses meet the criteria of achieving the best reach we could?

A lot of these questions needed to be asked and answers to be found in discussion with our NGO partners.

RCB accepts donations against a clear mandate promised to the donor. Were we fulfilling these completely? We had a moral responsibility not only to the donors whose money we had accepted in trust, but to the beneficiaries in whose name we had collected the funds. This is a huge responsibility and cannot be taken lightly.

So, as I started to assess each project, I realised that the pandemic and the long hiatus had impacted the scope of our projects. It also became apparent that we needed to re-look at some of our long-term projects and find better ways to make an impact.

We needed to find newer ways to face the challenges of physical distancing.

It also became apparent that any changes that were made would need to be sustainable and acceptable to the Presidents that followed.

So, the concept of a three-year plan evolved, and a draft was developed which will require consensus from the next three Presidents. We are working on this and hopefully will have a plan shortly. RCB's reputation as a premier Club must stay untarnished, always faithful to its past legacy.



KARISHMA & MONICA, FOUNDERS, CHANAKYA SCHOOL OF CRAFT, ON PRESERVING CRAFT LEGACIES AND EMPOWERING WOMEN ARTISANS

Our vision at Chanakya is to share India's finest craftsmanship with the rest of the world while maintaining our cultural sustainability and lending to the preservation of our precious craft legacy. This is my 24th year at Chanakya and I continue to learn from craft every single day. We have been fortunate to collaborate and partner with some of the finest design and couture houses across Europe and the USA and we are proud to represent our country's cultural and craft landscape globally.

Our school is India's first not-for-profit school teaching master craft techniques to women. The foundation believes in transforming societies by instilling a vision, making role-models and promoting a sense of community. Through our certificate craft programme, we have taught over 400 women since our inception in 2017 and hope to touch many more lives meaningfully.

MONICA SHAH

Hand-craftsmanship in India is traditionally taught from father to son; we thought it would be wonderful to open up this skill to women – the backbone of our communities – allowing them equal opportunities, and independence. The goal for the Chanakya School of Crafts is to create a platform of multi-dimensional learning, focus on arts and crafts by providing equal opportunities to often ignored backbone of our community – women. Our mission is to provide women

from low-income communities, the

high-quality education in hand embroidery enabling them to maximise their potential and enhance their lives. Our students study modules dealing with the use of technology, business acumen and starting new ventures. The benefit is two-fold – ancient techniques and skills are now revived and rejuvenated by the joy and ambition of those who are finally been empowered. The curriculum is both robust and holistic.

Over the course of one year, we cover over 300 craft techniques with modules on pattern making, design and colour. Colour theory as well as documentation, visits to the museums and industry visits. At CSC, traditional craftsmanship techniques is interpreted in contemporary ways to acknowledge, respect and protect the social environmental sustainability of our traditional, cultural expressions.

The curriculum is divided into two semesters that culminates with an internship that offers experience in global luxury craft making. Upon completion of the certificate one-year embroidery programme and internship, successful students have the opportunity to join our women's-only artisans' atelier with flexible timings where they earn a good income, respect, and become part of our ever-evolving creativity community.



The tribal women of the Vaidu community are now learning numbers, beginning with simple counting, and writing from 0 to 10.

While they are learning to read and write words, simple mathematics has been introduced to them. Knowing numbers along with alphabets will make them want to do much more. Younger girls will explore working in different avenues once they are literate.

'Keep the ocean clean! That's the most important thing!' sang our oldest Lighthouse students at the Litfest finale held on November 13th, 2021. The Litfest is an annual Lighthouse event where children explore different themes using language as a bridge.

This year, depending on their grade levels, kids learned about the inhabitants of Earth's deep, hydrological cycle and the worrying issue of ocean pollution. Around 50 young ones were present for the virtual event with their parents. RCB President Shernaz Vakil attended the event and interacted with them. She asked them what they had learned and expressed her appreciation for their presentations.

The show began with the tiny tots of K.G. showcasing the different undersea creatures by dressing up as them. From jellyfish to octopus, the audience applauded as the recorded video showed the babies performing their parts. This was followed by an informative session with students of classes 1 and 2 acquainted listeners with the finer points of the water cycle. Adental check-up camp was organised for Ananda Yaan's senior members at the Dr E. Moses Road, Worli, on November 18th, 2021. Six volunteers of the Rotaract Club of Government Dental College and Hospital, Mumbai, conducted the dental screening and counselling of 27 senior citizens.

Periodontal (gums) problems were a major issue. A few people with the tobacco-eating habit were found with lesions on the innerside of their lips and cheeks. Such patients were advised to quit the habit and counselled on how to do so.

Patients were also counselled about daily oral hygiene practices. Patients requiring treatment were referred to Government Dental College and Hospital, Mumbai.


