

A MOTHER'S DAY WELL SPENT!

Sunday before last, on Mother's Day, an intrepid group of regulars took a trip beyond the RCB model village of Pingemen to the two new villages we were about to inaugurate that day.

We were to visit the Integrated Village

Development Programme at the twin hamlets of Waghatpada and Wakadepada, impacting over 350 lives.

The villages faced acute challenges of lack of water for irrigation, lack of clean water for drinking, lack of consistent and affordable electricity, poor electrification of schools and Anganwadi, lack of sanitation facilities for part of the community, and poor street electrification.

It was early May and by 10 am it was a scorcher!

Walking into the fields to see our solar panels and pipelines in the noon-day sun took the breath out of us. However, being welcomed by the womenfolk in traditional Indian style, and laughing with the children at their newly renovated school reminded us why we were there and how we were transforming the lives of these farmers and their families.

We laughed, joked, and wished all the women sitting in obedient lines a very happy *Aai-cha Din*!

As we chatted with the farmers at the solar site, they were keen to show us their fields and what they would be able to grow with the additional water. We supported their needs by installing a 7.5HP solar submersible pump powered by 7.5KW of solar power, drawing water across an 1800m pipeline for drinking, domestic, and irrigation.

This would enable irrigation of over 20 acres of farmlands in the first fold, reviving the agricultural economy.

We had provided each home with a UV filter for clean drinking water and a tripod solar light with mobile charging and a portable solar lamp.

To further their need for accessible water, the villagers performed *shramdaan*, pulling water to their homes and installing a tap at their doorstep.

We also provided power to the school and Anganwadi by providing one 350W off-grid solar system each, powering up the lights and fans as well as the Smart TVs provide for digitally aided learning and engaged classrooms.

In addition, a community sanitation block was built for the homes that have no access to toilets, complete with a handwash station, allowing the village to move towards an Open Defecation Free (ODF) status and better hygiene.

And, as the afternoon drew to a close, and the ladies of the village dressed up in identical yellow saris and danced for us, our hearts sang with them in joy.

These village trips to Nasik and Palghar have now become fairly routine this year, as we complete close to 20 villages in Maharashtra, before the end of June.

We have yet to inaugurate 11 villages in the Savade area which we plan to do on June 11th, 2022. Come, join us, and see how we improve and impact the lives of our farmers.

Talk to them and understand how our initiatives have supported their lives, and then get inspired to do more! ~ President Shernaz Vakil

ROTARY CLUB OF BOMBAY CONFERRED THE BRAVERY AWARD TO POLICE NAIK PRASHANT GHARAT AND THE PV GANDHI EXCELLENCE IN PUBLIC LIFE AWARD TO ANAMI ROY, FORMER COMMISSIONER OF POLICE, **MUMBAI. A TRANSCRIPT OF MR. ROY'S ACCEPTANCE SPEECH**



Being in the police force or a life of civil service in the government gives us an opportunity to help and serve people, to better their lives. Those who are in the higher echelons of civil servicesparticularlycantakethatonedecision that can make such a difference to the lives of people. God gives you the opportunity to do this. Perhaps, when in service, you don't realise that.

Maybe, people like you and me can find ways to get things done. But the common man, particularly in our system, faces difficulties in getting simple things accomplished which should come to you as a right.

I decided not to measure my success or efficiency by how quickly I cleared the papers in front of me. Instead, I wanted to see the impact the paper was going to make to the other person, change their lives.

One time, I had come here, to Rotary, as Police Commissioner of Mumbai, and I must have done something that had shaken or disturbed people. So, they wanted to question me. But I am looking at every common man who has the right to ask the police and government on service and system. And that does not happen. We wanted to bring in transparency.

We created a Citizen Facilitation Centre. People don't know the basics of where to go if they want something done. The Mumbai Police Commissioner's office issues some 27 types of licences, so create simple lines, break institutional mechanisms.

The digital India initiative has changed many things. But what you need is process re-engineering. We have a 'one-size fits all - take it or leave it' kind of attitude. But people don't know how to take it or not to take it, so, we did process re-engineering, make things simple. Some of these initiatives had huge impact on people's lives.

In another exercise, we called all the people who wanted security clearance for their passport. The police are supposed to do this, but it remains pending for months on end and people don't get their passport. So, I put everyone – right from constables to the Joint Commissioner in my office and said they would not be allowed to leave the room until they had devised a system that would complete all passport enquiries in seven days. I said, 'You are not going out till you get a solution.' Sure enough, they did it, and we made it public.

When I saw the existing system, some 22 documents were required; I said, I can never get my passport in my life. I asked, 'Do any of you have all the documents?' No, so, I said, write that get any two of the following 10; any one of the following 11. All verifications should be complete in seven days. I had a dashboard, and all the passports would come before me. Everything was recorded, a clerk would tell me what was pending and what was completed. This is what we need, it is not rocket science. I want to know what it looks like from the other side. I want all the people in public service and public life to look at themselves and their role entirely from the perspective of the other person. Is he getting what he deserves, what is his right? There is plenty being done and plenty yet to be done.

Another thing is land records; all of you must have had experience of it, buying, selling, hoarding, transferring a land or property. What a nightmare it can be; even today, our land records are not universally digitised. Why can't we unshackle all those things? I have done experiments with this; some have met success and some not. But a lot of things depend on an individual. Institutionalisation is the biggest casualty in our system. Once the person who has taken the initiative goes, if the person who comes next is not interested, then it all collapses. Public service people are all willing to help and contribute. We created a bridge between the IT fraternity and the Mumbai police. All these giants of IT companies, you ask them one thing and they come with 10 solutions. But we have not tapped the potential for the benefit of the **people.** So, what you call as corporate circles and market circles, customer centricity is what we need to bring in public service and life.

Poor people, even today 62% of the population lives in slums, what is their life **like?** In respect to policing, what better can we offer them in terms of security? Can we make our services more targetted to them? Can anyone reach the police commissioner on the phone for their problems? Not one.

CHALAANG EXPLORES CULTURES OF INDIA

A 10-day summer camp was held for 130 tribal children of the Vaidu communities at Jogeshwari and Marol. Our education partner Vipla Foundation organised a camp which ensured that some life lessons would stay with the kids. RCB's Chalaang Summer Camp week was held from April 21st to May 3rd, 2022.

Vipla and RCB teams present onground oversaw how the kids were taught about India's different states, the uniqueness of the language, places, dishes, and the traditional attire of its people was shown, all with a focus on developmental domains within the state.

About 30 parents participated too. The children prepared songs, dances, and speeches for the last day. Rotarians were pleased to note that most of the children confidently shared their learning in front of the audience. The parents matched their enthusiasm with pride and tears.

The camp allowed for a rapport to be built up between all stakeholders in the work that RCB is doing with the Vaidu community. These are: the parents, children, project partners and RCB.







Vipla Foundation took 60 Vaidu kids to the premiere of the new movie *Jayesh Babu Jordar*. Vipla arranged for a bus to transport them and snacks, too. It was their first such outing. And look who they met!


