






LET'S WORK TOGETHER TO MAKE ROTARY UNSTOPPABLE

HOPE IS VITAL FOR EACH
ONE OF US. Rotary is the hope
for millions and it has been so for the
last century and more. To lead Rotary
Club of Bombay - an iconic institution
engaged in community service for
close to a century - is intimidating
for me. However, it also instills in me
a deep sense of responsibility and
privilege that as an RCB member

I am joined to the unique and

unprecedented Rotary movement.

As an organisation, Rotary has continuously improved its global relevance and it remains atop its expressed mandate. This is unparalleled. The global network of Rotary spanning across 200 + countries and the proximity to the community that its members, all volunteers, serve are its greatest strengths. This distinctive edge should allow Rotary to operate effectively even in an environment where institutional philanthropy is becoming the order of the day. The CSR framework in India has made this more conducive.

TO UNLEASH THE ACTUAL POWER OF ROTARY, I BELIEVE THAT ROTARY CLUBS IN OUR AREAS, ROTARY DISTRICTS IN THE REGION AND EVEN ACROSS THE COUNTRY SHOULD FORGE A CLOSER OPERATING STYLE. Instead of an aggregation of autonomous Clubs, Rotary could leverage its network by increasing the number of Clubs and Districts that

work together. This will result in greater impact and offer wider scale to the projects that are aligned to the seven avenues of service of Rotary.

My deliberations have made me realise the following in the context of our own Club:

RCB carries out community service projects through committees with clear objectives

for all inkingether share in port others in associate

which makes the delivery focussed but the outcome is unidimensional. It is akin to departments working as silos in a company.

I PROPOSE CROSS-POLLINATION OF ACTIVITIES ACROSS

COMMITTEES. For instance, adult literacy for women is as relevant to the community served by Ananda Yaan as any other group of women that the Adult Literacy committee identifies elsewhere. Likewise, we must evaluate if a homeopathy desk could meet the needs of "Lighthouse" children or a de-addiction programme could be the new programme at Cotton Green

Clinic. The list of embedding multiple activities in our existing community projects is encouraging.

"Serving Others' has no visible limit but we should measure the impact of our projects in a systematic manner.

I PROPOSE TO HAVE A "PROJECTS REVIEW COMMITTEE" WHOSE MEMBERS ARE NOT AFFILIATED TO ANY WORKING COMMITTEE.

Not only should our Club projects offer the desired and predefined outcomes but we should also assess if some of our projects have met their objects, outlived their utility and if we have made communities empowered and self-sustainable. This will create a new bandwidth for us to either replicate our successful projects in new communities or, indeed, take up new challenges.

I WOULD LIKE TO END BY **ENDORSING THAT ROTARIANS** ARE CHANGE-MAKERS, ROTARY IS INDEED THE PLATFORM TO START A CHANGE, NURTURE A CHANGE, MAGNIFY A CHANGE AND MAKE THAT CHANGE PERMANENT. ROTARY IS A POWERFUL CIVIC SOCIETY **ORGANISATION FUELLED BY** THE SPIRIT OF VOLUNTEERING. I WOULD LIKE TO SEE AS MANY OF OUR MEMBERS JOIN HANDS TO DO MORE. AND OUTDO NONE OTHER THAN OURSELVES. TOGETHER, WE CAN MAKE THE ROTARY MOVEMENT AN UNSTOPPABLE ONE.

JONES MAKES HISTORY AS RI'S

JENNIFER E. JONES IS FOUNDER AND PRESIDENT OF MEDIA STREET PRODUCTIONS INC., AN AWARD-WINNING MEDIA COMPANY IN WINDSOR, CANADA. She was chair of the board of governors of the University of Windsor and chair of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. She has been recognised for her service with the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award, a first for a Canadian. Jones holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.).

As the first woman to be elected president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement. "I believe that diversity, equity, and inclusion ... begins at the top and for us to realise growth in female membership and members under the age of forty — these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership," Jones said. "I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

Jones has been a Rotary member since 1997 and has served Rotary as RI vice president, director, training leader, committee chair, moderator, and district governor. She played a lead role in Rotary's rebranding effort by serving as chair of the Strengthening Rotary Advisory Group.

She is the co-chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee, which aims to raise \$150 million for polio eradication efforts. She also led the successful #RotaryResponds telethon in 2020, which raised critical funds for COVID-19 relief and was viewed by more than 65,000 people.

Jones has also received Rotary International's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She and her husband, Nick Krayacich, are members of The Rotary Foundation's Arch Klumph Society, Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society.

PRESIDENTIAL INITIATIVES 2022-23

Diversity is one of Rotary's longstanding core values and greatest strengths. Jones knows there is more to be done to ensure that Rotary's culture exemplifies our values of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI). Rotary, with input and guidance from the DEI Task Force, has strengthened our commitment to DEI, resulting in a greater focus on celebrating every individual's contributions, advancing equity, and creating a more welcoming and inclusive culture.

During the 2022-23 year, Jones encourages each of us to do our part to ensure Rotary is a welcoming and inclusive community by:

- Learning more about DEI in Rotary, including understanding definitions and how to celebrate and respect our differences.
- Determining why DEI matters to our club and community and how using DEI principles can help our club grow and become stronger.
- Raising awareness of DEI, including creating a DEI committee in your club that reflects the demographics of your community.
- Taking action on DEI in our club and community for instance educating yourself about underrepresented groups in your community in order to become a more knowledgeable and effective advocate for DEI.

Jones will also continue RI President Shekhar Mehta's Girls Empowerment initiative, recognizing that empowered girls become empowered women.

ALPHA DG SANDIP AGARWALLA:

The Quintessential Renaissance Man

The District Governor of District 3141 is a thirdgeneration Rotarian with a penchant for thinking big. Backed with doggedness to see things through and inimitable flair, the Alpha DG is a man on a mission.






N 1991 the Rotary Club of Bombay added to its ranks a bright-eyed young man, 29 years of age, when the average age of the 325+ member club was 65. DG Sandip Agarwalla recounts this time fondly. "I went from knowing nobody at the club, save for four or five couples who were friends of my parents, to making 325 friends in the course of a year." The gregarious and committed Rotarian went on to become the youngest President in the history of the now 93-year-old institution, at the age of 41 years and 12 days. This was exceptionally quick, in view of the prevalent culture at the Rotary Club of Bombay, which required prospective Presidents to have been members of the club for at least ten years. DG Sandip's term as President of the Rotary Club of Bombay is remembered as one of the finest, with a stellar show across the multiple facets of leading a Rotary club- be it the quality and impact of the service projects, the calibre of speakers






roped in, thoroughly engaging fellowships, or the record fundraising.

However, even more remarkable is that DG Sandip's zeal and appetite for taking on an active role in club affairs did not diminish after completing his term as the club President. In fact, ruminating on a moment in Rotary that was a source of personal pride, DG Sandip is quick to respond that repeatedly having been awarded 'Rotarian of the Year' by his club would rank at the very top. In his characteristic straightforward manner, he states, "Most past Presidents take on an advisory role within the club- there are of course exceptions to this, but I am happy to be a worker. I accept Chairmanship of Committees and have no airs about it. I am what I am because of my club". Wondrous indeed is the scope of what fits into a 24-hour day then. The leadership role in club affairs runs alongside DG Sandip's work for District 3141. He has served as Avenue Chair across multiple avenues for many District Governors. He has the rare distinction of having been requested to head The Rotary Foundation Avenue twice- an important responsibility he has discharged admirably. DG Sandip has also previously been the Group Head for TEACH and WinS, Chief Group Avenue Head of The Rotary Foundation, the District Secretary and Head of Public Image. In addition, he has been a member of the PRIP Ron Burton appointed National Working Group for CSR (Rotary India), an Executive Committee Member of the Rotary India CSR National Committee (RICSR), and the District Endowment

and Major Gifts Coordinator (DEMGC) for RI District 3141 for 2020-21. He is also the all-India Ambassador Coordinator for RAM (the Rotarians against Malaria Action Group) - Global, deputed with the challenging mandate of eradicating malaria on an all-India basis.

DG Sandip was also appointed as the Chair of the Programme Committee for the Rotary International Presidential Conference 2022 held in Hyderabad in April / May 2022. He was appointed as an advisor to the Rotary International Presidential Conference: Serve to bring Peace held in June 2022, at Houston. Both of these were rare honours as DGEs are usually not appointed to such positions. However, DG Sandip's initiation to the service mindset and the Rotary movement happened much earlier. Growing up in a family of ardent Rotariansincluding his grandfather late Bhagwati Prasad Agarwalla, the

Charter President of the Rotary Club of Dhanbad for two successive terms- he was quite used to listening to Rotary matters being discussed at the family dining table. Interestingly, he was privy to Rotary in action early on as well! Late Santosh Kumar Agarwalla, then DG of District 326 (undivided Bihar and Orissa), travelled across the states to conduct the customary OCVs (Official Club Visits) for all clubs in his district in 1972-73. He was accompanied by his son, who had summer vacations going on at the time- a precocious 11-year-old wielding a Super 8 camera as the

official photographer for the trip. This of course, was young Sandip, soaking in the experience as the family toured over 25 cities, having long committed his father's speeches to memory, thoroughly enjoying the warmth extended to them. As DG Sandip puts it, "This you see was 1972-3, long before there were hotels in most of the smaller towns and cities we visited. We were extended home hospitality.. for all meals, even overnight stays. We were treated like royalty."

He has clear memories of accompanying his father to Lake Placid, USA for when his father was training as a District Governor, followed by a wonderful time at the Houston Convention in 1972, where he specifically remembers being awed by the "sense of camaraderie and bonhomie of Rotarians meeting from all over the world to do good." As luck would have it, he is left with an incredible sense of déjà vu with the RI Convention returning to Houston in 2022. These early forays into the world of Rotary left an indelible impact on DG Sandip, who often states, "Rotary is a way of life for me". What followed then was

a two-year stint in Calcutta at La Martiniere. Then the family moved to Mumbai, where DG Sandip found intellectual succour at the John Connon and Cathedral School. In addition, the Interact Club at the school also gave him a chance to serve. Exciting and purposeful times ensued, with members of the Interact club being invited to attend the brilliantly conducted meetings at the Rotary Club of Bombay in pairs and two hours each Saturday being spent at community centres, teaching at municipal schools, or service activities for physically disabled people at Haji Ali and other centres. These were greatly encouraged by Mr. Kuruvilla Jacob, the Principal of the school and a Rotarian himself. DG Sandip

went on to become the President of the Interact Club. After school, he enrolled at Sydenham College. The college did not have a Rotaract club at the time, and DG Sandip became involved with PSERF (the Poor Students Educational Relief Fund), of which he went on to become the Chairman. His friend of 44 years, Mr. Jai Advani speaks of DG Sandip's very clear "passion for social work and helping others" at the time, when "little did we know then that this was the stepping stone for... making Rotary his entire life". In addition to setting the tone for the rest of his life, good work was carried out, including a fundraiser organised by way of a Jagjit Singh concert that raised INR 100,000an astronomical sum to have been raised by college students at the time.

In his final year of college, DG Sandip joined the family marble mining business. Busy times, with extended travel across the world for work ensued-sometimes for months at a time. It was also around this time that some moments which DG Sandip describes as "defining" or "turning points of his life" occurred. The first of these was his marriage with First Lady Malini Agarwalla, a brilliant and dedicated spouse who is a high-achiever much like him- a university topper and ranked national swimmer. The second was the birth of their children, Abhimanyu and Rishika. There's nothing more he enjoys than being with his family; his son Abhimanyu and wife, Priyanka - who have given DG Sandip the joys of his life - his grandchildren, Elina and Kai Bijoy; and his daughter Rishika and husband, Sanket.

Keenly doting on his children and now grandchildren, DG Sandip is described by friends and his spouse as a family man. He counts his grandfather, parents, and parents-in-law as his role models and is very attached to his mother. When he reflects on the most significant void in his life, it's the time of his father's demise. This was a mere two months before DG Sandip's installation as the President of the Rotary Club of Bombay, an event to which his father had been very much looking forward. He is also a dedicated partner who has unflinchingly supported First Lady Malini in her varied

endeavours, be it as President or

of Bombay; or when she built an extremely successful accessories business, Malaga, from the ground

Most who meet DG Sandip soon realise he is a man of uncommon intellectual capacity, but few may know he is a member of MENSA, the largest and oldest high IQ society in the world! This would most certainly hold him in good stead as he embarks on lofty goals for the Alpha year with impressive collaborations already lined up including those with the Oxford India Centre for Sustainable Development, UNICEF, Tata Consultancy Services, Aga Khan Agency for Habitat, and Tata Memorial Hospital. He believes one must "think big to do bigger and better.. and only those bigger than you can give you that direction and pizzazz." A man of varied interests and talents, DG Sandip enjoys music, especially when rendered live. He


is particularly partial to jazz and rock music. Every bit the intrepid traveller, he enjoys visiting historical places. The family is exceptionally athletic, with DG Sandip himself having captained his school and college table tennis teams. He plays and thoroughly enjoys cricket, and follows many

sports- be it basketball, wrestling, boxing, gymnastics, swimming, equestrian or fencing, and will often travel to watch matches live. If you thought that was all, do know he also enjoys reading non-fiction and cooking, especially Bengali cholar dal, aloor dum, and luchi! However, despite numerous interests, he is quite clear- "Rotary gives me a high..I have no passion other than Rotary".

Another striking aspect of DG Sandip's personality is his straightforwardness. He is unequivocal when it comes to matters in the interest of Rotary, be it through advocacy or presenting white papers to Rotary International.

Interestingly, with trademark straightforwardness and clarity of thought, DG Sandip recounts the anecdote penned down by Mr. Simon Sinek in Leaders Eat Last, wherein Mr. Sinek visited a conference as the Under Secretary of Defence. Sinek travelled business class, was ushered everywhere and finally handed a ceramic cup of coffee. The next year, when Sinek was to speak at the same conference, he was not the Under Secretary of Defence

anymore. Economy travel and no ushers aside, he finally poured himself coffee, in a styrofoam cup. DG Sandip makes it clear he is keenly aware of the respect and gravitas the position of the District Governor commands, and how it entails him being "first among equals for the year, and thereafter fall back to the ranks." He appears all set to do more than right by it, as he and the Alpha team are geared to think big, act big, and change big. DG Sandip is a man who believes in 'Carpe diem'- to seize the day- or in this case, the Alpha year and beyond! The man's ethos is perhaps best described by his friend and Club's President, Vineet Bhatnagar, when he says, "Here is a man who has no fear of a no. He is scarcely intimidated by the power of his own vision and ideas.. (with) his discipline, his eye for detail, his pursuit to see his ideas become actionable plans. For our own sake

I hope he will continue to delight us with his vision and the power of his ideas." Salut to that!


Dear President Vineet,


It's a joy to note that District 3141 enters






