What we sacrifice when we push ourselves to look worthy from someone else's point of view is the opportunity to live a life from a place of wholeness. We reject the idea that each one of us was born as an original version of the allness. Each one of us is a unique spark of the divine. And the reason we are unable to let go of that almost compulsive feeling to please others is because our attempts to truly express ourselves have, or are likely to, come up against our culture, family norms or simply the opinions of others about ourselves.

We have all experienced the pressure to live up to other people's expectations. Because we want to be accepted, because we are striving to be perfect.




The fundamental and moot point is that all of us are cognitively, emotionally, physically and perhaps even spiritually hard wired to experience love and belonging. And when we don't, we break. When we go through our lives pleasing, performing, proving and perfecting we end up saying YES when we mean NO and at times saying NO when we are desperate to say YES. This process is exhausting as internally we are resenting our own actions and words. It also takes us farther and farther from our true selves and simple jous of life.

Can we tell ourselves that "I am willing to choose discomfort over resentment. I am OK to live with the discomfort of not being what others want me to be because I don't want to lead a depreciated life where I resent my own actions"? To lead a life with less resentment requires that we set boundaries that stop others from influencing our original selves and allow us to remain authentic. It requires the courage to be imperfect, vulnerable, and set boundaries.

This requires some inner working to identify who we really are and then work upon being the best version of what we believe

we truly are. This is almost a spiritual exercise and one that is very likely to take you to a place of greater joy. I had outlined in an earlier article that authenticity is cultivating the courage to be imperfect.

One of the ways to operationalise this could be to begin by making a "Want List" and a "Joy List". COME UP WITH A LIST OF THINGS THAT YOU WANT - WHETHER TO PROVE YOURSELF PERFECT OR TO BE THE RIGHT IMAGE IN OTHER PEOPLE'S EYES. THEN MAKE A LIST OF THINGS OR EVENTS THAT GAVE YOU JOY BASED ON YOUR OWN EXPERIENCES AND EVIDENCE - ONES THAT LEFT YOU TRULY SPIRITED WITH CHILD-LIKE JOYS.

The one thing that many of us struggle with is to understand that worthiness has no prerequisites. We all need to find a way to say that "I am enough."



RCB CHECKS IN WITH GALE







PND BIMAL MEHTA REPORTS ON RCB'S VISIT TO GALE ON MARCH 5^{TH} , 2023

Rtn. Vinti Gajree, Rtn. Miral Shah, Rtn. Ptn. Seena Sanghi and I visited Gale Village to review projects undertaken during the year. Rahul Tiwrekar, founder of Diganta Swaraj, and his team were also present.

Our first stop was the Anganwadi where we met the sarpanch and the farmers. We have recently installed 25 drip irrigation pumps and distributed seeds for rabi crops. We were pleased to hear that our agriculture initiatives made a positive impact and would also significantly increase farmers' incomes this year. Many mentioned that they expected their earnings to increase by three or four times because of the year-round water availability.

Our next plan of action is:

- Kisan cards for farmers.
- Crop insurance.
- Training to improve crop yields and agricultural productivity.
- Regularise land records for farmers.
- Marketing initiatives to help farmers get a better price for crops.

We will facilitate some of these through the agriculture ministry, Government of Maharashtra.

RCB also spoke to a women's group to understand their issues and requirements as it was their responsibility to fetch water from the river. Before the lift irrigation







project, they spent three to four hours daily and walked approximately 5 km to fetch water. With water now available within 100 metres of their homes, the women have more time for other productive work. Many of them help men in the fields. The construction of individual toilets has also made a big difference to their lives from a safety and health perspective. We have built and renovated 55 toilets and hope to complete the balance 21 toilets within a month.

The sarpanch told us that all the villagers had opened bank accounts and obtained Aadhar cards. This will allow them to avail of various government schemes; the Diganta Swaraj team will facilitate this.

Construction of the Livelihood Centre is progressing well. We hope to finish construction in 45 days. The women will primarily run the Centre and we used this opportunity to discuss their ideas on how to run the centre. It has been decided to install ground nut processing and patrawali rice plate machines. The group will internally discuss what third activity they want to pursue and decide what kind of machine to procure. It was also decided to form a committee to monitor the progress of the activities and facilitate the marketing of the products. A representative of the Rotary Club of Bombay will be part of this committee.

Finally, we are kickstarting our impact assessment with a third-party agency in April.

While we are happy with the progress, much more remains to be done to make Gale a model village.

We want to do our best to escape from shame, failure, fears. But the reality is that we cannot numb dark emotions selectively. When we numb shame and fear, we are, by default, also numbing joy.

The children were also given free toothpastes and toothbrushes by IWA. 

Achim Fabig, German Consulate General, Mumbai

Achim Fabig has been the Consul General, German Consulate General in Mumbai since July 2022. However, this is not Mr. Fabig's first posting in India

Mr. Fabig was the Consul General, German Consulate General in Chennai. from July 2014 to July 2018. That posting was a homecoming of sorts for him as he actually began his career with an internship at the Max Mueller Bhavan, Madras, in 1991. This had been followed by an internship at the Indo-German Chamber of Commerce, New Delhi, in 1993.

These were also the years he studied law at University of



Passau and Freiburg, King's College, London (Diploma, 1991 – 1996). He gained work experience as a research assistant at the Max Plank Institute for International Criminal Law, Freiburg (1997 – 1998). A legal internship took place over approximately the same time period (1997-1999) at the Karlsruhe High Court. His entry into the Foreign Services began as a Foreign Service Trainee from May 2000 to June 2001. He joined the desk of the Federal Foreign Office, Berlin, from June 2001 to July 2003. After this came his first foreign posting when he was made Head of Consular Department, German Embassy Teheran, from July 2003 to August 2006.

Following this, he was sent as
First Secretary on a German
Permanent Mission to the
United Nations, New York, from
August 2006 to July 2009.
From July 2009 to June 2014,
he joined the Federal Foreign
Office again in Berlin as Deputy
Head of Human Resources
(Diplomatic). The Chennai
posting as Consul General came
immediately after this.
