"ROTARIANS DEBATE: THE PROMISE AND PERIL



Last Tuesday, a spirited debate was conducted amongst prominent Rotarians including Ratna Sharma, Runit Shah, Dipan Mehta, Ajay Kakar, Rina Deora and Ujjwala Singhania. The discussion centred on the potential benefits and drawbacks of the transformative artificial intelligence system, ChatGPT.

The host of the debate, **PN SATYAN ISRANI**, drew attention to the rapid rise of ChatGPT since its public launch only seven months prior. "ChatGPT took just two months to amass 100 million users, a milestone that took Gmail five years to achieve," he noted, adding that this accomplishment underscores the technology's soaring popularity.

The debate was structured with two teams - one arguing for the benefits of ChatGPT, the other against. Each speaker was allocated time to articulate their arguments, followed by an open question session from the audience.

In defence of ChatGPT, RTN. RUNIT
SHAH began his argument by sketching a brief history of how technology has evolved, eventually leading to the development of artificial intelligence.
Shah pointed out that just like other major technologies we now take for granted, such as the internet and smartphones, ChatGPT holds the potential to dramatically transform our lives. He emphasised that progression in technology is inevitable and we must adapt to reap its benefits.

Highlighting the risks of ChatGPT, RTN. UJJWALA SINGHANIA opened the counter-argument by stressing on the economic implications of AI, including possible job losses due to

automation, and the prohibitive costs of AI technology for rural and small-scale industries.

She also questioned the reliability of information output from ChatGPT, pointing out that the technology still relies on content from the internet. Furthermore, Singhania highlighted potential issues concerning security and privacy, cautioning that ChatGPT could potentially be used for illegal purposes and be vulnerable to data breaches.

RTN. DIPAN MEHTA, a member of the pro-ChatGPT team, endorsed the technology as a means of simplifying technology for less tech-savvy individuals. He provided examples from his own life, such as using ChatGPT to enhance his understanding of historical sites during a tour in Israel and employing it in his stockbroking business. Mehta also argued that

ChatGPT could help businesses increase productivity, improve quality output, and reduce costs.

In rebuttal, RTN. RINA DEORA, representing the group against ChatGPT, voiced concern over a growing dependency on AI in the educational sector, suggesting that it was diminishing the importance of human interaction. She quoted Narayana Murthy, the founder of Infosys, stating that even the most advanced AI such as ChatGPT, could not compete with the human mind.

Deora criticised ChatGPT for its lack of emotional connection, saying it falls short in offering unique insights and often provides overly detailed, wordy responses. She highlighted its inability to produce emotionally resonant content, concluding that ChatGPT fails to match human levels of expression and insight.

RTN. RATNA SHARMA, advocating for ChatGPT, then took the microphone and championed the possibilities AI provides in automating mundane tasks, freeing humans for creative and problemsolving endeavours. She further argued that ChatGPT could help individuals with disabilities overcome language barriers, and that the technology has immense potential in fields like medicine and scientific research.

Sharma also addressed the ethical considerations surrounding AI, emphasising the need for regulation, supervision, and continuous research to mitigate biases, limitations, and unintended consequences. She cited an initiative by the Indian government that seeks to analyze the use of ChatGPT and other AI tools to create an appropriate framework.

Concluding her argument, Sharma made

an impassioned plea for the acceptance and understanding of AI tools, likening them to machines created by humans for the benefit of humans, a sentiment resonated by a famous quote from the movie *The 3 Idiots*.

RTN. AJAY KAKAR then took the stand, arguing against ChatGPT, and questioned the premise of the debate, pointing out the difference between the present and future impacts of ChatGPT. He cited numerous examples where ChatGPT fell short, and questioned the number of people who actually benefit from the technology, implying that the number may be exaggerated.

Kakar closed his argument by citing Jeffrey Hinton, the 'Godfather of Artificial Intelligence', who has warned about the dangers of AI, and argued that ChatGPT has yet to prove its mettle.

The debate concluded with a rejoinder

from the other team, which included references to the potential benefits of ChatGPT in psychiatric therapy, as it provides objective and impartial responses. The against team then pointed out that while ChatGPT could be used to save lives in war strategy, its misuse could also lead to severe repercussions.

The lively debate provided a balanced perspective on the future of artificial intelligence, particularly concerning the role of ChatGPT. The audience was left to ponder whether the boon of AI technologies outweighs their potential risks.

However, as PN Satyan pointed out, regardless of one's stance on the matter, there's no denying that AI and ChatGPT are at the forefront of technological progression.

A lively discussion then followed with members from the audience airing their thoughts. DG Sandip Agarwalla asked panellists the full form of GPT to emphasise the point that most people are unaware of it. The full form is "Generative Pretrained Transformer," he shared.

IPP Shernaz Vakil then discussed the concern about biases in AI models. AI models, including GPT, she said, learned from a large volume of text data on the internet, and these texts often contained biases prevalent in society. These biases could then be inadvertently learned and reflected by AI models.

PN Satyan acknowledged these concerns and shared a piece of poetry generated by ChatGPT which reflected its potential benefits and pitfalls.

In the realm of advantages, ChatGPT does shine,

Empowering users with knowledge, oh so fine.

It offers quick answers, a vast sea of information,

Breaking down barriers, fostering global communication.

But with its brilliance, come concerns to bear,

Biases and misinformation, lurking in the air.

Guarding against pitfalls, a challenge we must face,

To ensure accuracy and fairness, with ethical embrace.

So let us embrace its strengths, with cautious delight,

Harnessing its power, to illuminate our sight.

With responsible usage, we can navigate its domain, Unleashing its potential, while mitigating any stain.

Rtn. Farhat Jamal gave a Vote of Thanks generated by ChatGPT which reflected the potential of AI in creating human-like text. Farhat Jamal ended the note by quoting Elon Musk's statement: "ChatGPT is scary good and we are not far from dangerously strong AI."

In summary, AI, and in this case, GPT, offer great potential for a variety of applications, from generating text to answering questions and more. However, like any technology, it comes with challenges, including potential biases in the output. It is important for

On May 13th, 2023, Dr. Manosi Lahiri delivered an insightful public talk as part of Rotary Club of Bombay's exhibition 'Mapped!' at the Durbar Hall, Asiatic Society of Mumbai, which was curated by Past Perfect.

The talk titled 'Mapping India: Then & Now' was an extension of her published masterpiece Mapping India and apprised attendees on the evolution of mapping systems that form the base of the GPS system we use today.

Dr. Manosi Lahiri, a professional geographer, IT entrepreneur, published author and founder of India's first

GIS company, ML Infomap, deeply appreciated the effort behind putting up the exhibition, and applauded the public engagement with rare maps and historical geography of the Indian subcontinent.

She has spoken at prestigious professional bodies including the Royal Geographical Society, London in 2012 and at Europalia 2013, in Brussels and it was thus a pleasure to have her among us. Her talk was followed by an interesting Q&A session.

Attendees of the talk left with an abundance of learnings, right from technicalities that formed part of the Great Trigonometrical Survey to forgotten stories of local heroes that made the surveys possible.

"Mapped: surveys that left behind a legacy" continues at the grand Durbar Hall of the Asiatic Library in May 2023 is open to the public until June 4th 2023. RCB's efforts elevate farmers' livelihood with sustainable agricultural practices in Chopda





The Rotary Club of Bombay (RCB) has persistently supported a unique project for three years, helping cotton farmers in Chopda, Jalgaon district, to tackle the pestilence of the Pink Boll Worm (PBW). This insect has been a formidable threat to the cotton yield, causing significant economic losses and hindrance in the textile industry.

Project Coordinator Rtn. Pradeep Gujarathi reports that there has been significant success this year in disrupting the life cycle of the PBW. This has resulted in notably less damage in the entire region of Chopda.

Under the project, farmers have been provided with critical tools to combat the PBW. These include 11,500 pheromone traps supplied by Pest Control Pvt Ltd. (PCI) and 2000 litres of two types of biopesticides – RALLINEEM and Neemark, both made from Neemseed extract, produced by TATA and Neemark respectively. The traps and biopesticides were made available at significantly reduced prices, making them accessible to the local farming community.

This vast initiative was made possible thanks to the dedicated staff of the VITTHAL-AFPRO-BCI Chopda unit. Their team, including 52 field facilitators and 4 unit managers, played a crucial role in reaching out to farmers. They provided education and support in installing the pheromone traps according to the guidelines. Scouting and monitoring of







the project are planned throughout the cotton season to ensure its success.

The project has extensively reached out to approximately 3500 farmers in around 73 villages, covering 4500 acres of agricultural land. The traps and natural pesticides were installed mostly by water-fed farmers, indirectly benefiting a larger group of rainfed farmers.

A crucial aspect of the initiative is the effective education and awareness created among farmers regarding sustainable pest control methods and management. The project has successfully demonstrated the use of natural pesticides like RALLINEEM and Neemark to the farmers, highlighting its advantages over chemical ones. This strategy has not only proven effective against the pests but also benefits the ecosystem by reducing toxic chemical usage and promoting better soil and water quality.

The positive impact of the project was recognised in a meeting with District Collector, Jalgaon, Mr. Aman Mittal and other agricultural officers. He appreciated RCB's efforts and suggested further assessment and study of the continued project's impact at Chopda.

The project's accomplishments are evident in the improved quality of the harvested seed cotton as reported by ginners in the area. RCB's continued efforts, together with the cooperation of local communities, promise a brighter future for sustainable farming in the region.





NEXT WEEK'S SPEAKER: NEETA LULLA


With a career spanning over a three decades across movies and fashion Neeta Lulla is an iconic fashion figure in the Indian fashion industry.
