- One word Dr. Shashi Tharoor used to describe himself: Confused.
- He finds the many memes made about him amusing and appreciates the creativity involved in them.
- The absence of an asylum and refugee bill in India frustrates him, he even prepared a draft and presented it to the then Home Minister, Rajnath Singh.
- Tharoor has written three novels and if he had to trade lives with a character from one, it would be from his novel "Show Business". The character is a person who reinvents himself as a godman to Bollywood stars, preaching hedonism.
- He had a chance to act


- in Bollywood as a foreign minister in a blockbuster film, but he declined the offer on the advice of a friend who suggested that playing a foreign minister might not help if he wanted to actually be one.
- His favourite politician of all time is Jawaharlal Nehru, not for political reasons, but for his mind, his readings, his retentive memory, and his exceptional writing abilities.
- Tharoor is an avid cricket fan, though he acknowledges he plays it very badly.
- When asked about the possibility of playing a finance minister in a movie, Tharoor expressed interest in replicating the memorable speech of former Finance

- Minister Manmohan Singh regarding the liberalisation of the Indian economy.
- He believes perception to be more important than truth in politics and the media. He illustrates this point with a personal experience where a woman declined to vote for him due to a misunderstanding about the term "cattle class".
- Tharoor advocates for a "common minimum programme" to address the polarised political landscape, urging politicians to find common ground to improve the lives of their fellow citizens, despite their differences. He emphasises the need for healthy debate and friendships across political lines for the betterment of the country.

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


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PROFILE OF AWARDEE DR. RAJU MOTIRAM KASAMBE






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
