Mr. Jackie Shroff, Indian actor and former model, in conversation with Rtn. Priya Tanna on success, style and soul

Rtn. Priya Tanna: Forty years of acting, 250 movies, 13 languages. Multiple accolades including many Filmfare Awards and that's just a part of it. Rarely does this level of achievement come with that level of personality as a person. That's really what he is, to not just me, but to a whole lot of us. It's how he shows up, not just at his work, but for the people in his life. For the things that matter.

Probably the only guy who can walk into a room with a plant and a tie — or a necktie — and make it look really, really cool. He really brings the swag in the *swagat*, if I can say that. He filled up our lives with his meaningful roles, he also filled up our world with his meaningful work. That's one of the reasons I'm so excited to talk to him today — causes ranging from thalassaemia, to adopting villages, to adopting 15 cows, to organic produce, to him walking around with this plant. And we need to know a lot more about where that's coming from.

I couldn't imagine that a man whose name was Jai Kishan Kakubhai Shroff, who then became Bhidu and Dada... between these two names, there's a really long journey. What most of you all don't know — and Jackie doesn't remember — is that I started my career with him; he was my first-ever film interview. I was all of 21, a little reporter at *The Afternoon Dispatch and Courier*, and always wanted to meet a film star. And my then boss Behram Contractor said, "Do you want to interview Jackie Shroff?" And I'm like, "Oh my God. But I don't know what to ask him." He said, "Just go meet him. He's a really nice guy." And I'm like, "No film star's a nice guy?"

The interview was being held at NCPA Apartments. I walk in and Jackie is standing there like this cool guy with a cigarette in his hand.

He said, "Hi sweetheart, are you going to interview me?"

I said, "Yes."

He said, "Let's do the interview outside. It's a beautiful day."

Little did I know that when he said 'outside', it meant the parapet of the balcony. Both of us were sitting on the parapet with our legs dangling and me with the full fear of vertigo and thinking, "This could be my first and last interview as I fall to my death". And him sitting there like he's been doing this his whole life. And the two of us in a conversation that just went from everything to everything. Me, walking away, realising that this could be and probably may be the nicest film star I will ever know. And that hasn't changed.

So, please extend a really hearty Rotary welcome to Jackie Shroff. I'm so glad we're on a stage today and none of us are hanging off anywhere.

Jackie, I have a whole line of questions but there are a couple of lovely ladies here who want to know: why are you walking around with a plant?

JACKIE SHROFF: Thank you so much. You see, I'm a guy from Mumbai; I used to stay here at Teen Batti. To come out here to the



beautiful Taj Hotel, I mean, we used to be scared to get in. Ramma Bans had her health club here, and we used to be scared of her. Now, suddenly, I'm out here on the stage at Taj and thank you to all the seniors for so much love and respect. I'm so happy to be up here. 96 years! *Bahut bhaari bhidu, aise hi chitak ke rehna, ek dusre ko haath dena, jhaad ko paani dena, badhana* (Very impressive, my friends! Keep going strong like this, help each other out, water the plants, and keep progressing.) Absence of malice — that's all we need. We're sitting out here amongst the best of the best of Mumbai. I'm so honoured. It's a pleasure being out here.

Rtn. Priya: Jackie, let's talk a little bit about *Hero*. What do you think led to its success? Did you think it would become the film it did? What do you think worked in favour of *Hero*? What made it iconic?

JACKIE: I swear to God I have no idea how. I knew he would handle it, he's got to handle it. I told him, I have no idea of acting; I have no idea of the language — I am from Mumbai, Teen Batti, *meri jabaan bekaar hai* (my language is useless) — but he said, "This is what I want. And love changes you," he says. I liked that thought. I said, "Love changes the guy, I will work so hard." So I got into it, and I said, "Sir, you'll have to take care of me. I won't be able to remember anything." He said, "Don't worry, just flow." He took care of me and everybody's taken care of me. Down the line, everyone's taken care of me. I don't know how they do it, but they do it. It's like Maa's blessing, out in open, *jo aaya, aaya, jo gaya, gaya* (Whatever came, came; whatever went, went)!

Rtn. Priya: You've played a ghost, a gangster, a love-struck hero. Is there a role you really want to play that you have not played?

JACKIE: I never desired anything. Never thought of anything. What comes my way, I take it. Its ups and downs are there. I see it in front of my eyes. Everybody sees it. I flow with the tide — I mean, you know it yourself — enjoy yourself. *Majja leveenay jao (Have fun as you go)*. Look at the tide. I was watching it. Just enjoy it and leave, man. Just leave, but leave behind something good for kids to come. It's simple. It's not a science. Everybody's got children, grandchildren at home. It's our job. We can't leave filth for them. It should not be coffee table talk. You see plastic and then you say, "*Ye kitna plastic hai (There is so much plastic)*." Who's responsible?



Rtn. Priya: OK, I'm going to ask you another question pertaining to films, and then I want to jump away from films because you are the sum total of so many things. You're not just a film star. Which was probably the most challenging role you've played to date?

JACKIE: Can't answer that. Because it was a challenge for the technician — they were very worried. "How the hell do I make this *lakdi* work?" I was like water, just flow. Whatever colour he wants. I'm just like a blank paper. Who paints? It's alright. It's just a bloody canvas.



Rtn. Priya: It's a miracle you've not written a book. But is there a favourite role?

JACKIE: It was Dev Anand saab who took me in Swami Dada as second lead. He saw one of my ads, and he said, "Jackie, Jackie, Jackie. *Subah subah tumhari tasveer dekhi, shaam ko tum mere samne khade ho. Tumhe ek role zaroor dunga (I saw a picture of you in the morning, and by evening you're here, standing in front of me. I will definitely give you a role)*." And I said, "Ji, giving me a role?" His son, who I used to know, was with me, and I got the second lead. I told my mum and 15 days later, Dev saab calls me and says, "Jackie, *woh role Mithun da ko diya hai (Jackie, I have given that role to Mithun da)*." And I was made a henchman to the villain and I was not even the right-hand; I was his left-hand. I had been demoted in 15 days. Mom asked, "What happened?" Well, I'm still in the film. I'm a fan of Dev saab's. I just want to hang around. Even if I get beaten up by guys, I don't mind. I mean, I do it on my streets also. It's not a big deal. And I became a hero. And then Subhash ji saw... I don't know what happened, but Subhash ji wanted a new guy. And I was there. One of the guys who used to know me — he said, "*Hai ek ladka, Jackie, ek villain ke chamche ka role kiya hai. But modelling karta hai, Teen Batti ka ladka hai.*" Toh mereko bulaya ("*There's this guy, Jackie, who played the role of a villain's sidekick. But he does modelling, he's a boy from Teen Batti.*") And they called me.



So, Subhash ji saw that ad, and said, "*Mereko aisa hi ladka chahiye, mawwali type ka teri tarah*" ("*I need a guy just like you, a street-smart/rough type*").

Sorry guys, *lekin aaj woh mawwali baitha hai, aap log bahot pyaar de raila hai, sunn raila hai. Mereko ghar pe bhi bulana khane ke liye kabhi kabhi.* (But today that street-smart guy is sitting here, you all are giving so much love, listening to me. Please call me home for meals sometimes, too.) Even if you do a pot-luck, I am in."

Rtn. Priya: Jackie, if you had to start all over again today, in this day and age, you've observed generations of film stars coming and going, you've seen films, you've seen evolution, you've seen cinema change — why, how much has stayed the same? Would you do anything differently? What advice would you give yourself?





JACKIE: The first film — back to Dev saab — there was a shot I had to do in which his double was holding me, and I'm supposed to go down backwards with my neck like this. I said, "I can't do it. I can't do it." So the fight guy — master, got angry, and said some words. So Dev saab, from there, said, "Take it easy, take it easy. *Naya ladka hai seekh jaayega. Sikhao usko yaar (He's new, he will learn. You teach him)!*"

I said, "Me, a junior artist and a senior technician?" My confidence was boosted. So that's what I feel when I see a little child who comes in — any new boy or girl who comes in — I feel that it's just not my son Tiger that I love. Everybody's my Tiger there. I mean, because I was taken care of.

Rtn. Priya: That's so lovely. You felt the love. So you're giving in.

JACKIE: Yeah. I thought — I said bang on. I mean, you looked after me. It's not demeaning. You fall. You rise up. How does it make a difference, right? Just a bloody coffee table talk again.

Rtn. Priya: Right. So you get called bhidu and tapori and dada, and yet you make it to the best-dressed lists in your Armani suits and Gucci ties and Hermes belts. This is such a dichotomy. There is this street side of you, and then there is this really sharp side of you that shows up. Who's the real Jackie?

JACKIE: Thank you so much for all those beautiful names you just gave me. It's just me. *Hawa ki tarha hu main (I am like the wind)!* *I am Teen Batti ka ladka (I am a boy from Teen Batti).* The driver's son is my friend and the diamond merchant's son is also my friend. I would know everyone, from the minister's bodyguard to the minister's driver — everyone — we would play cricket together. So, I am just me. Then I could see everything. I could go down to Somerset House, Breach Candy. Go to Breach Candy pool. Man! It was difficult, but then I could go with my girlfriend then, Ayesha, now my wife of 48 years now. Yeah! *Chitak ke rehneka, koshish karneka, todne ka nahi (Be together, try harder, don't break).*

Itna acha nahi banneka ki bhagwan, itna bura nahi banneka ki shaitaan. Beech ka banke chalneka agar ban sakta hai toh (Don't become so good that you become God, don't become so bad that you become the devil. If you can manage to stay in the middle, then just do that.). That's it, just enjoy each other's company, be friends, be buddies, but don't crack.

Rtn. Priya: Actually, what he's saying — and it's being said with so much humour — but it's such an important tenet for life, right? That you have to be equanimous. Whether it is that you're talking to a driver or you're talking to a corporate. And I think one of the things everybody can pay testament to, where Jackie is concerned, is the way he makes you feel. I saw it — I think when Rina and Akhil and I were down — we saw him hugging the guy at the entrance, posing for pictures, you know, with everyone. And I think that's not just for the paparazzi. That's not just for the sake of it. That's so much of the person. It really is!

Jackie, you are amongst the first film stars who went corporate — who went into the whole entrepreneurial mode. You are the one who started off this journey by investing in Sony. What led you to it?



INAUGURATION OF IVD IN PIMPURNA

On June 19th, 2025, battling heavy downpour and traffic, President Satyan Israni, IVD Co-chair Pulin Shroff, and donor representative PP Framroze Mehta were determined to reach their destination, Pimpurna, a remote village hidden among the hills in Jawhar. Their visit wasn't just ceremonial; it was a celebration of hope, resilience, and transformation. What greeted them was not the Pimpurna of the past, but a community glowing quite literally with renewed life.

Just a few months ago, Pimpurna's 186 families, totalling over 830 villagers, were living in harsh conditions. Despite the presence of the nearby dam, power outages were a daily reality. Nights fell in darkness, roads were unsafe, and homes were dimly lit, if at all. Clean drinking water was scarce, exposing the villagers to waterborne diseases. The Anganwadi was crumbling, no longer a safe space for children. The Zilla Parishad (ZP) school lacked even the basics, no proper lighting, no functional blackboards, and no digital tools to enhance learning. The result? Poor hygiene, low student attendance, and an overall sense of neglect.

But change was inevitable. With the support of Rotary Club of Bombay & Frashogar Charities and implementation partner Chirag Rural Development Foundation, a sustainable, community-led solution was put in motion. Every household in the village received a solar lighting kit, a tripod-mounted solar lamp with a mobile charging port for home use and a portable lamp for the remote "Jhaaps" where families work during the farming season. Along with the lights, families received water filters, bringing clean drinking water into their daily lives, many for the first time.

The transformation didn't stop at homes. Nineteen solar-powered streetlights now brighten village pathways, lighting up Pimpurna's evenings and making movement safer after dark. The Anganwadi was repaired and equipped with a 1.8 KW solar system, a Smart TV, and a library stocked with multilingual storybooks, toys, and learning tools. A clean, safe toilet was also constructed especially to support young mothers and children offering them dignity, privacy, and a healthier start to each day. What was once a neglected space is now a vibrant centre for early childhood learning, operating under the BALA (Building As Learning Aid) model.

The ZP school too got a fresh start. A similar solar system now powers fans, lights, a Smart TV, and educational content that engages its 79 students and re-energizes their teachers. A handwashing station with integrated water storage was constructed, encouraging better hygiene and ensuring cleaner, safer school environments.

All of this was not simply installed... Villagers were trained, and local committees were formed to manage, monitor, and sustain the new infrastructure. Ownership was embedded in the process from the beginning.

And so, when the RCB team stepped into the newly restored Anganwadi and school, lights on, children laughing, and a palpable sense of pride in the air, they didn't just witness a successful project. They witnessed a rebirth of possibilities for an entire village. In that moment, under the monsoon skies, Pimpurna stood tall, illuminated not just by solar energy, but by the power of collaboration, community, and care.

Project details from July 1st to date:

- A short film was completed, produced, and directed by Nabeel Abbas, who runs a successful digital agency, among other ventures. The script was written by Anushree, a copywriter at VML – the largest advertising agency in India. The voice-over for the entire two-minute film was provided by film icon Ms. Pooja Bhatt, who also makes a special appearance at the end. The film highlights the plight of stray dogs and encourages people to adopt Indies rather than purchasing pedigree dogs. It was launched at the Rotary Club of Bombay meeting on June 3rd, 2025.
- Ms. Gayatri Ruia has kindly agreed to support our fundraiser by offering the use of her premises at Palladium. Further details will be shared in due course.
- Discussions are currently underway with Vantara to organise a potential retreat aligned with the Club's animal welfare initiatives.
- An animal rescue ambulance was donated by PP Ramesh Narayan to the NGO World For All.
- August 16th, 2025: An online talk was held to plan a wildlife photography exhibition and sale to raise funds for animal welfare initiatives.

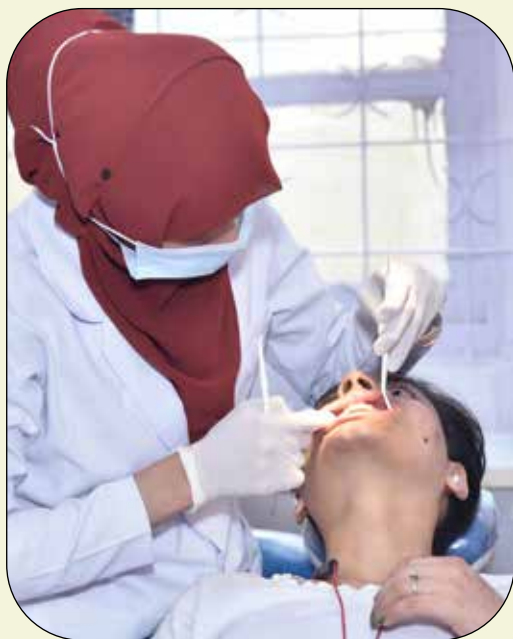

Status of projects completed during the year:

- *Housing for Cancer Patients and Families Receiving Treatment at Tata Memorial Hospital (TMH), Mumbai:* The objective of this project is to provide affordable housing for out-of-town cancer patients and their families, in close proximity to TMH.
- Under a formal MoU, MHADA has offered 100 flats to TMH for a period of 30 years. These fully furnished flats, equipped with all basic amenities, are located at Building 5D, 16th–24th floors, in the Bombay Dyeing Mills Compound, Bhoiwada, just ten minutes from TMH.
- At any given time, the facility accommodates 84 patients and their families, along with 12 flats allocated for doctors. The Rotary Club of Bombay provides housekeeping, 24x7 security, and overall maintenance of the premises.
- Since inception, the Dharamshala has supported 1,781 cancer patients and their families. A Rotary Club of Bombay office is situated on-site to ensure the smooth and consistent running of the facility.

Occupancy: The Dharamshala maintains an average daily occupancy rate of 90% to 95%, with the ultimate aim of reaching 100%.

Nutritious and Hygienic Meals: As of date, the Dharamshala kitchen has served 1,15,015 meals to residents.

Status of ongoing project

The Rotary HDFC TMC Dharamshala provides 84 well-designed flats for patients and their families, and 12 flats for doctors and nurses from TMC. Since its launch, more than 1,781 beneficiaries have received support.

The Dharamshala kitchen, in partnership with the WithArya Foundation, delivers fresh and nutritious meals daily. JanPro offers around-the-clock housekeeping, supervised by a professional facility management team. VCare provides transport services to and from TMC for patients and their families. Raj Securities ensures resident safety through 24/7 security monitoring.

Status of projects completed during the year

Rs. 15 lakhs are given every year as operating costs to the Mankhurd Centre. Rs. 28,000 was spent for the Christmas party.

Committee members joined President Satyan Israni and Director PP Framroze Mehta for a Christmas celebration at the Mankhurd Centre, hosting 50 children with special needs and their families.

The event featured a cake-cutting ceremony and gala party, followed by an inclusive group therapy session bringing together children, parents, and Rotarians. Each child received a Doraemon-themed study table and school bag as Christmas gifts.

During the visit, the committee reviewed the centre's comprehensive support structure, which includes occupational therapists, a clinical psychologist, and weekly speech therapy sessions. The programme maintains daily progress reports for each child and trains parents in specialised care techniques to support their children's development and prepare them for potential integration into specialised schools.

The committee has requested additional suggestions from staff to further enhance the programme's effectiveness.

Support for orthotic devices

Rs. 49,000/- was given for orthotic devices for the children at the Mankhurd Centre.

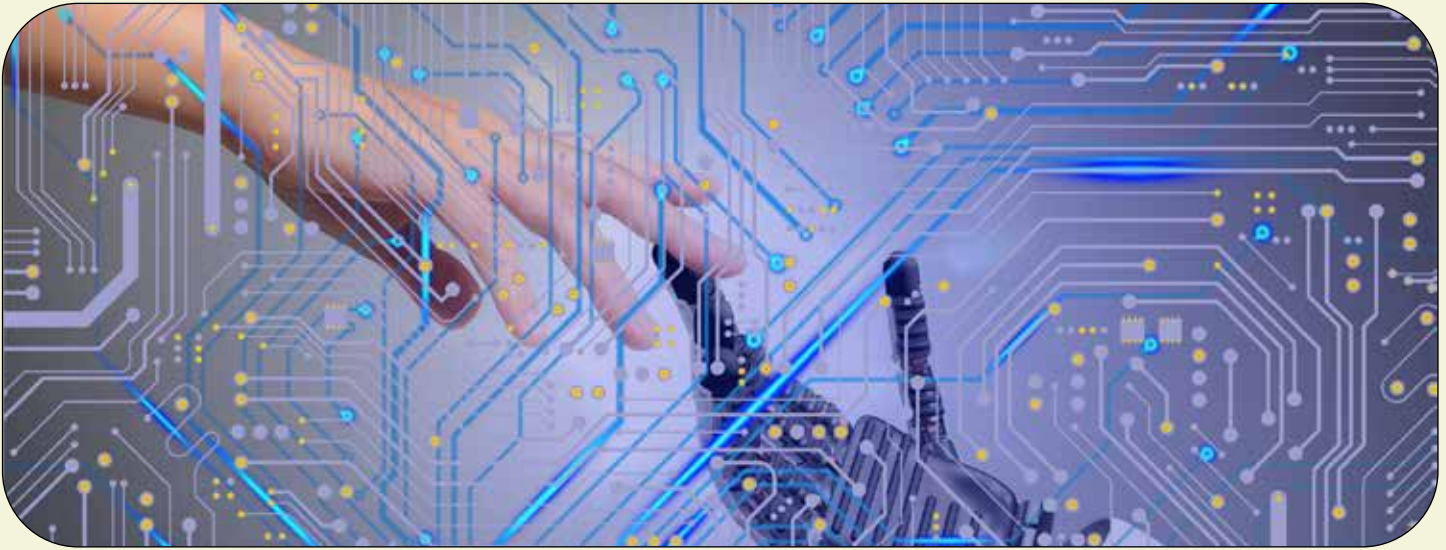

In the first quarter of 2025, the Community Future Learning Centre (CFLC) and IT Innovation Labs (ITIL) at Boisar were

officially inaugurated, marking a significant milestone in the expansion of our educational outreach initiatives.

Status of ongoing projects:

The Wada Lab commenced operations in March 2024 and is currently fully functional. Both the CFLC and ITIL centres in Boisar are also operational and actively serving the community.

The Palghar Lab, which began in January 2022, has continued to show strong

Projects update

1. CHANDRAGAV

Donors: Iron Oxide (through PP Shernaz Vakil & family) and Narayan (through PP Ramesh Narayan)

- Implemented solar household solutions and street electrification. Undertook the integrated development of the Anganwadi and school. Additionally, 17 farming families now have access to irrigation water throughout the year.

2. BHOYEPADA, VANIPADA, KHOSTE GAVTHAN, KHOSTE GRAM PANCHAYAT, VIKRAMGAD, PALGHAR

Donor: Sumitomo Chemical India Ltd (through PP Preeti Mehta)

- The electrification of 19.5 kW by solar energy has been completed. This included home solar solutions, household water filters, and the electrification of the school and Anganwadi.
- The Anganwadi centres received toys, tools, and a library kit. Training sessions for the sevikas were also conducted to ensure that early childhood development parameters are met, enabling children to be school-ready.
- Nutrition and menstrual health & hygiene workshops were conducted for girls and women in the community. These addressed malnutrition and promoted the use of locally available nutritional options.
- Solar irrigation systems now provide water for year-long cultivation, benefitting 54 farming families. Officers from the Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) conducted training sessions on sustainable cropping practices, further strengthening the initiative.

- A total of 11 acres are under cultivation with onion, groundnut, and gavar seeds, supported by PP Ramesh Narayan. In the first trial crop cycle, each of the supported farmers earned between Rs. 20,000 to 30,000 in just four months.

3. PIMPURNA, DABHOSA, JAWHAR TALUKA

Donor: Frashogar Charities

- A total of 186 households in Pimpurna received a tripod solar light with a mobile charging port, as well as a portable solar lamp for outdoor use. Nineteen solar street lights were installed at strategic locations, making village roads safer after sunset and encouraging community interaction.
- Water filtration systems were provided to each home to safeguard villagers' health.
- Major repairs were undertaken in the Anganwadi to ensure safety and functionality, using the Building As A Learning Aid (B.A.L.A.) approach. A handwash station was constructed to promote hygiene. A 1.8 kW solar system was installed in the Anganwadi to support lights, fans, and a Smart TV. Educational content and a bilingual storybook library were also provided to foster a reading culture and enhance learning experiences.
- A similar 1.8 kW solar system was installed at the ZP School, along with a Smart TV and a library featuring learning materials. Community training and the formation of committees for the school and Anganwadi were also undertaken.

Status of the project:

The Rotary Club of Bombay Legal Awareness Committee conducted an online event on Saturday, September 21st, 2024, to spread legal awareness on the rights and protections of senior citizens. This event was supported by the Maharashtra Human Rights Commission, the District Legal Services Authority, and the Rotary District Baghbaan Disability to Ability avenue. The event reached full capacity, with over 100 participants. In addition to individual

participants, many old age homes and shelters across the state of Maharashtra also logged in and facilitated the participation of several senior citizens residing in these institutions.

The event was moderated by the Chair of the RCB Legal Awareness Committee, Rtn. Tahera Mandviwala. PE Bimal Mehta introduced the event, while PP Ramesh Narayan assisted with and attended the session. Several District dignitaries were also present. DG Rtn. Chetan Desai and Dr. Mona Shah attended and shared a few words. The speakers included representatives and members of the Maharashtra Human Rights Commission and the District Legal Services Authority.

The event was highly informative and interactive, receiving excellent feedback from attendees. Important topics such as the Senior Citizens Act and other applicable laws, policies, and schemes for senior

citizens; their human and fundamental rights; and succession planning (including wills, probate, family settlements/arrangements, and gifts) were discussed with practical examples and implications. Attendees raised several questions and concerns, which were addressed and deliberated upon throughout the session. Overall, it was a highly useful and far-reaching legal awareness initiative.

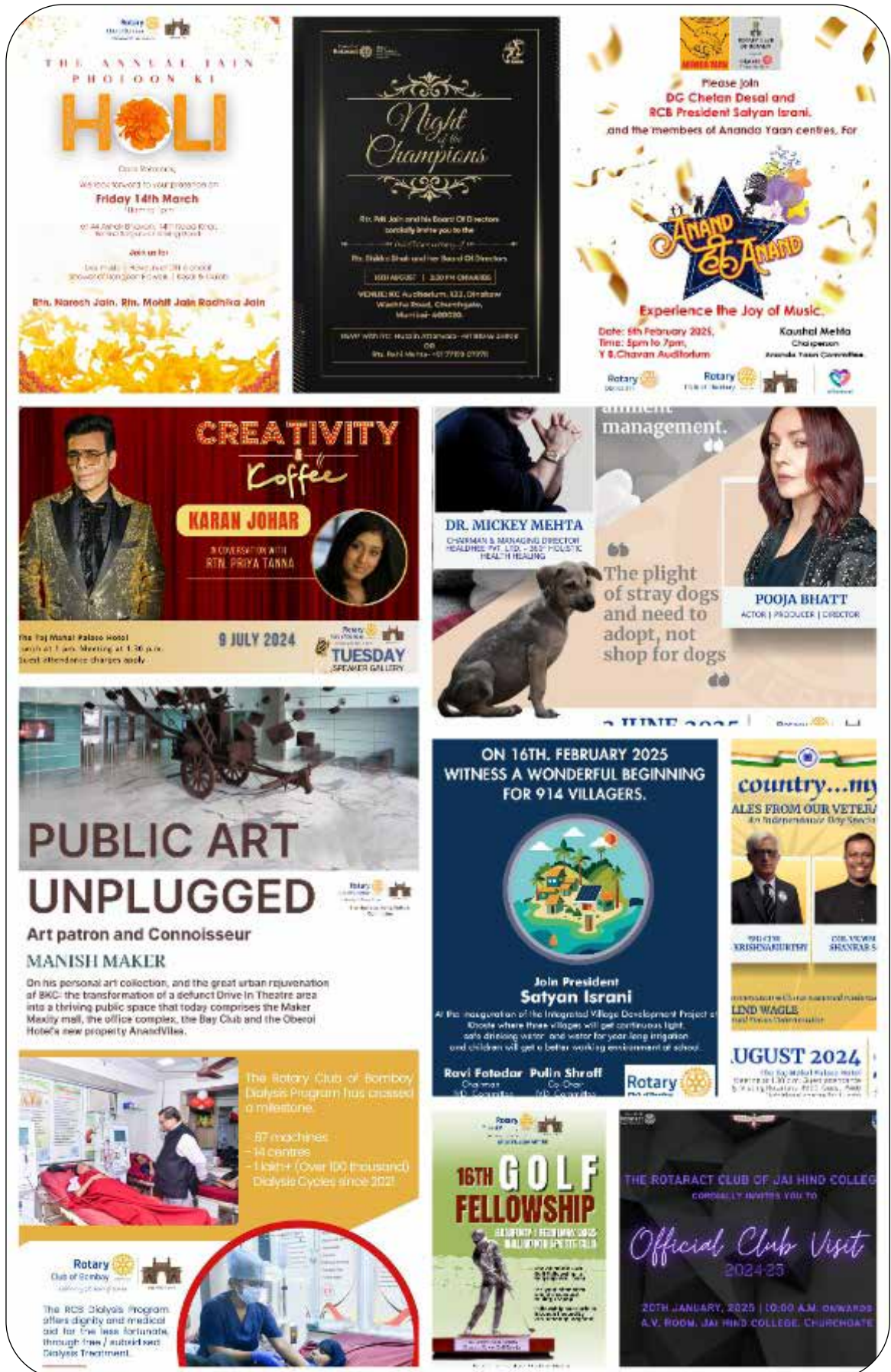

ROTARACT

The Rotaract Club of Atlas successfully concluded SAATHI: An NGO mela, a community platform promoting collaboration between NGOs, Rotaractors, and the public. The event featured 45 NGO stalls, including 22 commercial stalls showcasing handcrafted items by underprivileged and differently-abled individuals, and 23 awareness stalls addressing social issues.

Interactive zones included carnival rooms, obstacle courses, planetarium experiences, and self-defense workshops, engaging 350 underprivileged children in life skills development. Over 800 attendees — including corporates, Rotarians, students, and families — participated in demonstrations and sessions covering animal welfare, education, environmental conservation, and mental health. Each participating NGO received Rs. 5,000 to support their missions, with ten sponsors backing the initiative.



The Rotaract Club of Jai Hind College completed a comprehensive slum development project targeting Health, Hunger, Education, and Safety for over 400 families. The initiative, funded through “Silent Saturdays” door-to-door drives and business sponsorships, established an education centre benefiting 300 children and distributed 200 stationery kits.

Key achievements included facilitating ration cards for undocumented residents, sponsoring life-saving heart treatment for a family’s sole breadwinner, and distributing 400 hygiene kits. The project provided healthy meals for five days, conducted 15 skill workshops, and delivered safety education through street plays addressing cybercrime and child protection.

The multi-week campaign impacted 1,000+ individuals, demonstrating sustainable community development through education infrastructure and health support.

The Rotaract Club of Sydenham College executed AMBIENTE 3.0, an environmental cleanup trek to Irshalgad Fort, promoting sustainable trekking practices and waste management education. Partnering with Milles2Go and Nadhal Village authorities, the initiative engaged 80+ participants including 35 Rotaractors in responsible environmental action.

The project, spanning October to February, raised Rs. 45,000 through participation fees to cover transportation, local refreshments, and cleanup equipment. Nadhal villagers provided food and resting facilities, directly benefiting 15 locals while indirectly impacting 500+ future trekkers.

The 100+ volunteer hours demonstrated successful community collaboration, combining fitness activities with civic responsibility while preserving natural heritage and supporting local communities through eco-conscious tourism.

girls studying at KGSS Hindi Medium School, Malad. This year, we increased outreach through a fund-raiser held in July and August, raising Rs. 4,70,000/-. With tuition fees at Rs. 1,500/- per student, the initiative benefitted 300+ students.

Ananda Yaan Independence Day activities:

Distributed gifts to 40 members of Ananda Yaan across three centres. The Rs. 7,000/- cost was funded by Satellite Club members. Gifts included thalis and paper/tote bags.

Tata Memorial Hospital:

Development of infrastructure and support

Construction of a new boys' hostel is underway, thanks to a generous donation from an NGO. The three-storey facility will house up to 400 students and will be equipped with bunk beds and essential amenities to ensure a comfortable living environment.

Co-curricular achievements

Students have excelled in sports such as kabaddi, kho-kho, volleyball, running, high jump, long jump, marathon, and relay races. The college also maintains a tradition of participating in the annual science exhibition.

The "One Student, One Tree" plantation initiative, launched in 2004, continues to thrive with active upkeep of the campus greenery. The college also conducts seminars on career development, health, and personal hygiene, led by the principal and faculty.

Many alumni who benefited from these initiatives have gone on to successful careers in fields such as medicine, engineering, education, law enforcement, nursing, and government services. Plans are underway to invite these alumni to share their experiences with current students.

The Ashram School offers primary education from Years 1 to 7, while the secondary school covers Years 8 to 10.

Training & skill development

Salon technicians Aslam Agari and Shyamali Pujari successfully completed the L'Oréal Professional Certification Course on hair colour and hair care. Monthly training sessions focused on advanced hair styling, toning, balayage techniques, colour keying, and client consultation. Both staff and interns engaged in hands-on training, improving service quality and client satisfaction.

October 2024: Foot spa service for 32 staff members at Bloomberg

November 2024: Visit by the DB Board and RCB DB Board

December 2024: One-day self-grooming workshop for salon staff and the local transgender community

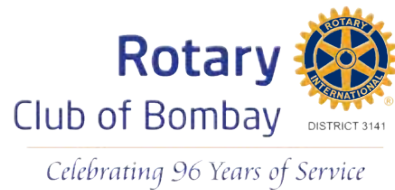
