## Pashupati Nath Pandey, Pr. Additional Director General, DRI, on countering drug trafficking, smuggling, & national security threats.



Drug trafficking and smuggling are not ordinary crimes. They have grown into highly organized, multi-trillion-dollar global industries that affect people far beyond those directly involved. Their consequences are felt in public health, the economy, and in matters of national security. Combating these threats is not the task of the government alone; it requires collective responsibility and participation from society as a whole.

### THE DRUG TRAFFICKING CHALLENGE

#### From Transit Hub to Consumption Market

For many years, India was viewed primarily as a transit country, given its geographic location between the Golden Crescent and the Golden Triangle. However, the trend has shifted alarmingly in recent years. India is no longer just a transit route; it is now a growing consumption market. This change is having a direct impact on young people, who are increasingly vulnerable to addiction and its devastating socio-economic consequences.

#### Changing Trends in Drugs

The nature of narcotics has also changed. Previously,

heroin and opium were the primary threats. Today, the greater risk lies in synthetic drugs and high-potency cannabis varieties like hydroponic weeds. These substances are easier to manufacture, transport, and conceal, often in small laboratories or through new trafficking methods. Their potency makes them more addictive and harmful, and their circulation within the country poses a far greater health risk.

### Organized Networks and Exploitation

Drug networks are not small-time operations. They are well-structured criminal syndicates, often operating internationally. Their methods include using unsuspecting individuals as couriers or facilitators. Young men and women are especially targeted, sometimes drawn in by the promise of easy money, only to find themselves trapped in a dangerous cycle. Once involved, exiting these networks becomes extremely difficult.

## SMUGGLING AND ITS WIDER IMPLICATIONS

### Beyond Drugs

Smuggling is not confined to narcotics. It extends to goods like gold, diamonds, cigarettes, electronics, wildlife, and antiques. Each of these trades has its own impact:

- **Economic Impact:** Smuggling deprives the country of legitimate revenue and disadvantages honest businesses that pay taxes and follow the rules.
- **Social Impact:** Cheaper illicit goods, like cigarettes or counterfeit electronics, encourage unhealthy consumption patterns and undermine consumer trust, while posing serious health and safety risks to citizens.
- **Cultural Impact:** The illegal trade in antiques and heritage objects robs the country of its cultural wealth.
- **Security Impact:** Profits from smuggling and illicit trade via third countries often fund activities that directly threaten national security.

### Globalisation and Technology

With the rise of global trade and technology, criminals are exploiting systems built for efficiency and convenience. E-commerce platforms and rapid courier services allow small consignments to cross borders almost invisibly. A parcel arriving at your doorstep in two days may have traveled across continents with little scrutiny.

- **Fake identities, forged documents,** and repeated misuse of addresses have made enforcement even more challenging.
- **Technology,** while a tool for progress, is being used just as effectively by criminals to expand their networks.

### National Security Dimensions

Illicit trade is not just about money. It carries serious implications for security. Illegal consignment carries the possibility of misuse of supply chains for contraband. Criminal syndicates, motivated by profit, may collaborate with groups that harbor larger, more dangerous motives. History has shown that trade routes and cargo systems can be exploited to transport harmful materials alongside legitimate goods. In a world where threats are increasingly asymmetric, vigilance is non-negotiable.

## A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY

### Role of Government

Agencies work tirelessly to identify and dismantle organized networks. They employ intelligence, technology, and inter-agency cooperation to stay ahead of constantly evolving threats. Unlike street-level policing, these agencies often focus on the larger picture—identifying syndicates rather than small-time offenders—so that the roots of the problem are cut off.

### Role of Communities and Citizens

However, government efforts alone cannot succeed. Society must play its part:

- Observing and **reporting suspicious activity** in neighborhoods.
- **Educating young people** about the dangers of drug abuse.
- **Promoting ethical trade practices** in business and industry.

Even small acts of awareness can disrupt criminal activity. For example, unusual movement in a community, odd smells, or sudden unexplained wealth should not be ignored. Collective vigilance creates an environment where criminals cannot thrive.

### Role of Industry and Business

Industry and trade groups, too, have a stake in this. Smuggling undermines legitimate commerce and erodes competitiveness. By promoting compliance, transparency, and collaboration with authorities, businesses can protect both their interests and the national economy.

### The Path Forward

To counter these challenges effectively, three things are essential:

1. **Collaboration** – A united effort between government agencies, citizens, businesses, and community organizations.
2. **Awareness** – Spreading knowledge about the dangers of drugs and the impacts of smuggling, especially among the youth.
3. **Vigilance** – Staying alert to evolving threats and being proactive in addressing them before they cause harm.

## CONCLUSION

Drug trafficking and smuggling are evolving challenges that exploit the very systems of trust, trade, and technology which modern societies rely on. They damage public health, weaken the economy, and pose risks to national security. Addressing them requires more than just enforcement: it demands a shared sense of responsibility.

When citizens, communities, and businesses join hands with government agencies, the collective strength becomes a powerful deterrent against these networks. Together, society can protect its people, its economy, and its future.

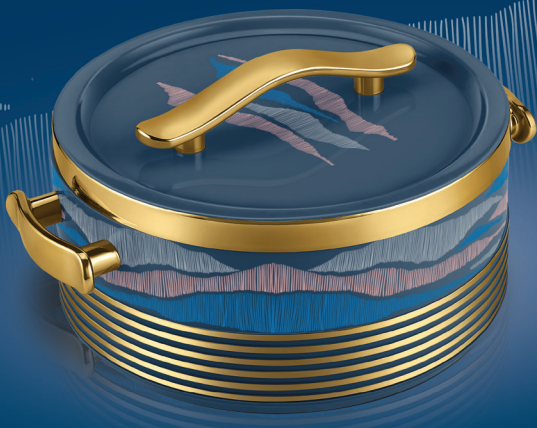

# FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK



## Dear Rotarians,

I hope you are doing well.

Torrential rains in Jammu and Punjab severely damaged the regions, causing significant hardship for local residents. Floodwaters inundated homes and farmland, leading to widespread displacement and loss of property.

RCB has consistently demonstrated leadership in supporting communities affected by disasters. This year was no exception. Through the generosity of our members, the dedicated efforts of ARRFC & PDG Sandip Agarwalla, and collaboration with our Rotary partners in Jammu and Punjab, we were able to promptly provide water filters, bedding, and other essential aid within five days.

Mumbai encountered ongoing heavy rainfall, along with increased traffic congestion in South Mumbai due to the Maratha reservation event. Despite these conditions, projects continued as scheduled and weekly meetings were held as planned. The project team, staff, and members maintained operations and ensured that scheduled events took place despite the challenging weather and traffic circumstances.

On September 5<sup>th</sup>, we inaugurated the much-awaited AI tutor at our BY Centre at the NMJ School. We distributed 36 tablets thanks to the generous donation by SP Jain School of Global Management through the efforts of Rtn. Mudit & Rtn. Ptn. Malti Jain. These tablets are equipped with the AI Tutor to support the students' learning journey. On September 11<sup>th</sup>, our Heritage

Art and Culture Committee organised the grand opening of the legendary artist Madhvi Parekh's latest collection of works, Remembered Tales.

This month, we launched a new Rotary initiative: the Anaemia Mitigation Programme in Dahanu Zilla Parishad Schools. The programme aims to identify anaemia prevalence, analyse gender distribution, and provide timely medical support. In phase one, we are focusing on two school districts serving over 14,000 children. Special thanks to Rtn. Vishal Vora for conceptualising and driving this initiative.

This month, our Adult Literacy Committee held a medical camp at Mumbai Central Prison for around 400 inmates and staff. RCB is also providing adult literacy classes and starting a skills development programme for inmates. Thanks to Rtn. Samina Khorakiwala and Wockhardt Foundation for organising the medical camp, and to Rotarians Paritosh Rungta and Runit Shah for leading the project.

We also had engaging projects and workshops at our BY, AY, and Lighthouse Centres.

In September, we hosted a distinguished group of speakers, beginning with an insightful fireside chat featuring Member of Parliament Milind Deora and renowned television personality Cyrus Broacha on the topic of India at the Crossroads of Culture and Power. Bhushan Gagrani, BMC Commissioner and Administrator, presented his vision for Mumbai City. The event focused on the future of Mumbai and was attended by more than 150 members. During his address, Gagrani outlined strategic initiatives aimed at improving infrastructure, sustainability, and quality of life in Mumbai.

On September 16<sup>th</sup>, we presented the Taru Lalvani Award for Environment Protection to Zero Circle founder Neha Jain for her innovative work transforming seaweed into flexible, plastic-like material, helping reduce plastic use. The following week saw a fireside chat by Rtn. Priya Tanna with Diipa and Oleg Buller Khosla discussing their entrepreneurial experience in developing a global cosmetics brand.

And finally, we ended the month with another engaging talk by Pashupati Nath

Pandey, DRI Mumbai Zone, on countering drug trafficking, smuggling, and national security threats.

Our Fellowship, Satellite Members, and Sports Committee all demonstrated robust engagement this month. On September 18<sup>th</sup>, we held our inaugural in-camera session at the elegant House of Rose venue, featuring Ami Ganatra's presentation on "Decoding Dharma – Unravelling How Our Epics Remain Relevant Even Today." A big thank you to Rtn. Purnima Sheth for her gracious hospitality and the delightful culinary offerings.

The members of the Satellite Club organised a vibrant evening of speed networking. With 20 members joining this Rotary year, the event was designed as a fun ice breaker. Our dynamic President Tanisha Parekh has big plans, and I look forward to a year of impactful events.

Finally, I would like to extend my appreciation to Moy and Mehernosh for their invaluable efforts in organising an excellent bridge tournament in partnership with the Rotary Club of Bombay Midtown at the Royal Yacht Club on September 27<sup>th</sup>. The event was held in true Rotary spirit, fostering both enjoyment and camaraderie among participants.

In October, two new projects will begin. A sports development programme will be conducted for students at SD Kadam School in Palghar, as well as at Ashram School and Taparia College in Talwada. A Transformational Learning Programme Using Toys will be implemented at SD Kadam School in partnership with Toy Bank.

Planning has also commenced for an extension at Taparia College, which is expected to be a major project this year.

I trust you have received my appeal regarding financial support for our club's projects. Every contribution plays a vital role in advancing our mission to build a brighter future for the community. I appreciate your consideration and look forward to your support.

However, being young, they are often unable to participate in evening celebrations outside school. Many students request the school every year to allow them to perform Garba during school hours.

On this occasion, it was decided that students would participate in Garba during Bhavishya Yaan timing. While school uniforms replaced traditional Garba attire, the students did not mind and enthusiastically joined the dance. A good number of students attended and fully engaged in the activity.

Teachers ensured that the celebration met key educational and cultural objectives. They explained the significance of Navratri, emphasising the victory of good over evil, and highlighted the importance of preserving cultural heritage, promoting community engagement, and providing an enjoyable yet educational experience.

All students participated enthusiastically, including those who were initially shy or reserved. The joy of performing Garba was evident as the children kept requesting more time to continue dancing. The event successfully combined fun, learning, and cultural awareness, making it a memorable celebration for all participants.



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# Transformational Learning Project, Workshop Visit

The Rotary Club of Bombay is partnering with the Opentree Foundation to implement the Life Skills Play Programme, also known as the 'Transformational Learning' project, benefiting around 1,200 children (aged 3–14 years) at S.T. Kadam School in Palghar. On behalf of the RCB, this initiative is being driven by Rotarian Ami Jagtiani and implemented by 'Toybank', the Opentree Foundation's flagship project. This project has already positively benefited over 150,000 children in 12 districts of Maharashtra by integrating play-based learning into the academic curriculum to support holistic development. By leveraging the power of play, the project aims to equip children from marginalised communities with essential life skills and emotional development. This collaboration

aims to enhance teaching strategies and provide valuable insights into individual student learning, thereby creating a more engaging educational environment.

On September 30<sup>th</sup>, 2025, along with representatives of Toybank and Rotarians (Rtn. Ami Jagtiani and Rtn. Anushka Jagtiani), the day began with the Transformational Learning workshop for the teachers at S.T. Kadam School in Palghar, followed by play sessions with the children from Grade 8. The classroom was lively with excitement as the children enthusiastically engaged in discussions, strategising, and sharing their ideas on how to play the games to the best of their abilities. Curated board games and play materials were provided to teachers during the workshop to promote critical thinking,

cognitive skills, socio-emotional skills, and communication skills. The teachers were very receptive to the suggestions made by the Toybank team. More than 26 teachers and 40 students participated in the workshop.

The Toybank team, including the Outreach Playworkers (OPW) and the Play Centre Facilitators (PCF), led the Transformational Learning workshop. They ensured that the games aligned with children's learning needs and supported teachers to use these games in classrooms.

RCB's vision is to start with the approximately 1,200 students at S.T. Kadam. Our specific role in this project involves providing financial support for play sessions, deploying volunteers, and actively participating in play-based annual events.

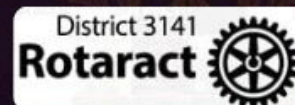

The initiative received generous support from the Ratanchand Hirachand Foundation and was facilitated

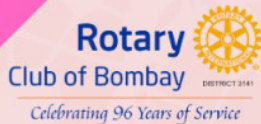

# Health Screening Camp at Arthur Road Jail: A Step Towards Inclusive Healthcare

On September 27<sup>th</sup>, 2025, Wockhardt Foundation organised a comprehensive health screening camp at Arthur Road Jail, Mumbai Central Prison. The initiative, held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., aimed to extend medical support to the often-overlooked inmate population and jail staff.

A total of 210 beneficiaries received free medical consultations and health check-ups. Services offered included diagnosis and consultation by qualified medical officers, blood pressure, random blood sugar and haemoglobin tests, ECG, dermatological and ophthalmological consultations, and computerised eye check-ups. Notably, 147 free spectacles were distributed to inmates and staff, addressing a major gap in vision care. Additionally, 23 individuals were referred to general physicians, 10 to dermatologists, and 15 to ophthalmologists for further treatment.

The camp highlighted the importance of early detection in preventing serious health conditions. Regular medical screenings, especially in high-stress environments like prisons, can significantly improve health outcomes.

Wockhardt Foundation, known for its humanitarian initiatives such as E-Learning, Gur+ Dialysis Centres and Khel Khel Mein, continues to bridge healthcare disparities. By conducting such inclusive medical interventions, it reaffirms its commitment to holistic community well-being and equitable healthcare access for all, including society's most marginalised.

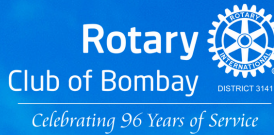
