Dr. Debarag Banerjee, Chief AI & Data Officer, L&T Finance Ltd. On 'The Digital & AI Journey of Larsen & Toubro'



Hello. Thank you for inviting me, I am happy to be here.

Just to add to my background, I started my journey in India itself. Back in the early 90s, I wrote my first AI paper here at IIT Kharagpur when I was a student. Most of the rest of my career, however, I worked in the Valley, where I finished my PhD and worked in larger companies, as well as founded two startups taking them to successful exits.

What brought me back to India was when I realised that this is a country reinventing itself on the backbone of internet infrastructure and really taking mobile commerce to a different level, and now also in e-governance, which opens up significant opportunities for more advanced banking and financial services.

L&T Finance is in the business of lending to millions of customers in India. Just to touch upon a few of our lines of business, as I understand that many of you are small business owners. We offer SME loans, two-wheeler loans, home loans, and so on in the urban segment. Similarly, we have almost a half-and-half split between urban and rural India, where we are one of the most successful microfinance lenders. We are one of the top tractor lenders in India. By the way, a little trivia: if you go by the actual number

of tractors, India is the biggest tractor market in the world.

Recently, we acquired a few other businesses like gold loans and so on. The reason I am touching upon this is because, as I understand, some of your initiatives are not confined only to Mumbai, but you are doing very laudable work in rural corners of the country as well.

Now, let me first give you a little idea about LLMs. LLM stands for Large Language Models. The most popular one that almost all of you have come across is ChatGPT, right? But there are many more models, and they have evolved over time.

You can see that as things progressed, the topmost position has been swinging back and forth. It has not always been OpenAI and Sam Altman. There have been players coming and going. Some of the open-source models, where technically you do not have to pay royalties to anyone to use them, are also catching up. But there is still a gap.

We are still using a closed-source model, in our case Gemini from Google. One of the things we do is structure our applications in a flexible way so that we can switch from one model to another, from one cloud provider like Google to another like Azure

or Amazon, or even our own private cloud, whenever necessary.

Now, why do we use LLMs? Why do we use generative AI?

If you look at the state-of-the-art performance of AI models, over time they are approaching, and in many cases exceeding, the capability of an average human in performing many kinds of work.

AI models today are increasingly being benchmarked against human capability across a variety of tasks. These include image recognition, such as identifying objects within a scene, writing code independently, understanding English instructions, reasoning, and several other cognitive tasks.

Over time, AI performance across these areas has improved significantly. One by one, we are seeing artificial intelligence match and, in many cases, exceed the capability of an average human in specific tasks. Expert-level capability may take longer, but the progress is clear.

The reason we are using these models is not just to make processes cheaper, but to perform certain tasks better and more efficiently.

Many of you may have heard, if you follow discussions in the AI industry, that the amount of infrastructure being built for AI runs into trillions of dollars. To generate returns on that scale of investment, there are concerns around token costs, compute costs, and infrastructure expenses. Some believe this could eventually become unsustainable.

However, what we are seeing is that the cost of running these models continues to decline year after year. If you compare the early days of ChatGPT to current costs, they have already fallen by a factor of nearly 1,000.

If history is any guide, AI is going to become both cheaper and easier to use over time.

At the same time, models are also becoming smarter. So the direction in which the industry is moving is clear: models are becoming more capable while simultaneously becoming more cost-effective.



At present, there is still a small gap before most models reach the level of intelligence and practical utility that we ideally want. Among the current leaders are models such as Gemini, which we use, along with strong models emerging from China and leading contenders from OpenAI.

That is broadly how we evaluate and decide which models to use.

Your particular use cases of AI may fall in a different part of this curve. But over time, the clear progression is that more and more models are going to show up in the green, useful, intelligent area.

Now, while generative AI systems like ChatGPT and Claude makes the news, AI is much broader than that.

In a nutshell, AI can be thought of as any computer system that makes decisions or produces outputs close to what a human would produce.

Earlier, these were largely human-in-the-loop systems. Then machine learning changed everything. You feed the computer all the decisions that were previously taken, and it learns and figures out the rules by itself. That opened up many uses of AI in everything from credit underwriting to product recommendations on Amazon.

Over time, these models became more sophisticated, somewhat mimicking how the brain works, although not entirely. The latest generations that emerged from that are called transformers, which can figure out outcomes from natural language questions, generate images, and much more.

Now, while that is entertaining, where does the usefulness come in? That is the innermost box, agentic AI.

We are now beginning to figure out how to use predictive models and generative models together, and build software applications around them easily without requiring large teams of engineers writing code. This allows AI to do useful work in enterprises.



Now, coming to our business of lending.

At its core, lending is a relatively simple business. You lend at a certain rate of interest using money borrowed at a lower interest rate. Along the way, some customers default, resulting in credit losses. Some customers require repeated follow-ups, increasing collection costs. Then there is the cost of running the business, which consists of operating expenses. What remains is your return on assets.

We built a system called Cyclops and later augmented it with something called Helios. These are AI systems that help bring down our credit costs.

As the portfolio grows, we use something called Nostradamus, which tries to predict how millions of loans are going to evolve over time and what collection actions we should take. That helps reduce collection costs.

Finally, agentic AI, where AI works alongside humans faster and more accurately, helps bring down operating costs. This reduces the cost curve further and ultimately results in greater profit and higher return on assets.

Another way to look at this is through the dimension of growth.

Cyclops enables smart differentiation between good and bad borrowers and helps optimise loan amount, pricing, and segment identification.

More precisely, what you want to find are people who will become prime borrowers but have not yet reached that point. That is where intelligence comes in, and that fuels growth.

AI is at the very core of how we are

reimagining lending at L&T Finance in a digitally connected world.

Now, I talked about Cyclops. What is it?

This is probably a very familiar scene in the streets of Mumbai or any Indian city. You see young people on motorbikes doing their daily jobs, whether delivering e-commerce packages or something else.

These bikes cost about a lakh or more. That sounds like a lot. But when you think about how much they earn, the EMI of a standard loan to buy one of these bikes can amount to nearly half of their monthly earnings.

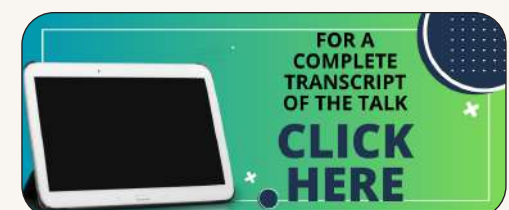
That opens up a Pandora's box of challenges for traditional lending. They may not have enough assets on their books, enough proof of income, or enough stability of income.

While India has improved significantly in documentation and e-documentation, a substantial part of the population still finds obtaining the right documentation challenging.

So how do we solve this? How do we provide credit access where it is needed?

Our answer was Cyclops. To give you an idea of how Cyclops works, imagine a person walks into a two-wheeler dealership to get a bike loan.

Let us pick a particular persona. Suppose we

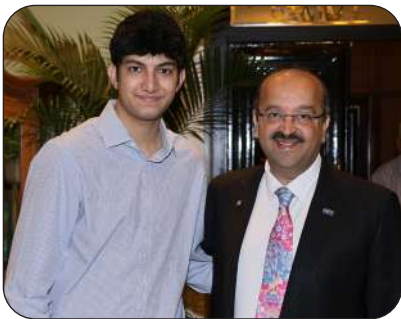

A New Digital Milestone— Successful launch of the RCB IT Innovation Labs Consolidated Digital Dashboard



On June 23rd, 2026, the Rotary Club of Bombay IT Innovation Labs marked a significant milestone with the successful launch of the RCB IT Innovation Labs Consolidated Digital Dashboard at the iconic Taj Mahal Palace Hotel, Mumbai. The platform was inaugurated by Dr. Debarag Banerjee, Chief AI & Data Officer, L&T Finance Ltd.

The launch represented far more than the unveiling of a digital platform. It symbolised the collective vision, dedication, and sustained efforts of Rotarians, mentors, faculty, and students who have shaped the IT Innovation Labs journey over the years. Designed as both a Showcase Platform and an Operating Platform, the Dashboard reflects the spirit of innovation and excellence at the heart of the initiative.

The Dashboard serves as a vibrant digital repository, bringing together student innovations, projects, achievements, competitions, faculty contributions, committee leadership, knowledge partnerships, and measurable impact

across all centres. It not only captures data but also showcases inspiring stories of students transforming ideas into meaningful solutions.

Equally important is its role in strengthening operational excellence and governance. Through a secure, role-based system for students, parents, teachers, centre administrators, system administrators, and Rotarians, the platform integrates learning management, attendance, project tracking, certifications, reporting, communication and real-time analytics. This ensures that every student, project and centre remains connected and visible.

The Rotary Club of Bombay IT Innovation Labs has emerged as one of Rotary's most impactful educational initiatives, empowering over 10,500 students across Maharashtra. With more than 1,500 innovation projects, 25+ laboratories, and 16 dedicated faculty members, the programme equips students from Classes VI to X with future-ready skills in Robotics and

Automation, Artificial Intelligence and Generative AI, Internet of Things, 3D Modelling and 3D Printing, and Smart Integrated Systems.

Innovation centres in Boisar, Dahanu, Palghar, Wada, and Mumbai, including ITI Elphinstone Road, have become hubs of creativity and problem-solving. Students are developing practical solutions such as Smart River Plastic Waste Segregation Systems, Flood Monitoring Systems, Smart Precision Farming, and 3D-printed engineering models.

The initiative continues under the leadership of Rtn. Uday Sanghani, ARRFC & PDG Sandip Agarwalla and PP Vineet Bhatnagar, supported by faculty consultants, mentors, and volunteers. Aligned with Skill India, Digital India, Atmanirbhar Bharat and NEP 2020, the IT Innovation Labs are nurturing a generation of confident innovators, changemakers and future leaders.

The RCB AI Picnic: Goodies, Giggles, Google and Gen AI

On a warm Saturday afternoon at ITI Elphinstone, Mumbai, a remarkable learning experience unfolded as Rotarians gathered for an engaging session on Generative AI titled The AI Picnic: Goodies, Giggles, Google and Gen AI.

The cohort included Rtn. Sushil Chandiramani, Rtn. Gaurav Nevatia, Rtn. Mudit Jain, Rtn. Miral Shah, Rtn. Sonali Parekh, Rtn. Dilip Dalal, Rtn. Swati Mayekar, Rtn. Malti Jain, Rtn. Jagdish Malkani, Dr. Nisheeta Agarwalla, Dr. Sonia Kothari, Rtn. Meera Alreja, Rtn. Pranay Vakil, Rtn. Rina Deora and Rtn. Kaavya Chandiramani.

Despite being accomplished professionals, business leaders and community contributors, they entered the classroom as students, carrying laptops, notebooks and, most importantly, curiosity. The atmosphere felt nostalgic, almost like the first day of school, filled with excitement, laughter and anticipation.

Led by Prof. Uday, the session began by demystifying AI and introducing participants to ChatGPT. What initially seemed complex and intimidating quickly became accessible. Participants learned that AI is fundamentally about conversation and that effective

outcomes depend greatly on how questions are framed.

A key highlight was the introduction of the RGOLD prompting framework: Role, Goal, Objective, Limits and Details. This simple yet powerful structure helped participants understand how detailed prompts can produce precise, relevant and actionable results. The learning quickly became practical, with participants exploring applications in Rotary projects, business strategy, research, writing and productivity.

The excitement grew further with the introduction of Google NotebookLM. Participants were amazed by its ability to turn reports, presentations, PDFs and research documents into interactive knowledge bases capable of generating summaries, answering questions and identifying insights. Rotary members immediately recognised its value for project documentation, newsletters, committee work and planning.

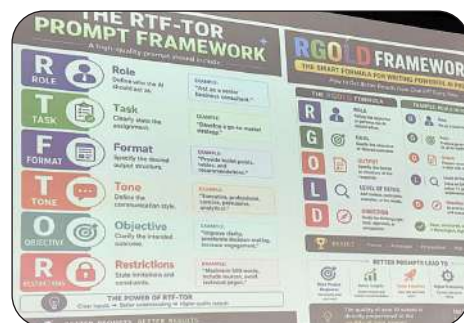
The session also explored creative AI tools such as Google Vids and YouTube Create, along with image-generation platforms. These demonstrations revealed how AI can transform ideas into presentations, videos and visuals with surprising ease, opening exciting possibilities for communication,

fundraising and storytelling.

The feedback reflected the impact of the session. Rtn. Meera Alreja shared, “Thank you so much Uday. It is a wonderful session... doing a lot to ignite our curiosity.” Rtn. Mudit Jain wrote, “Superb Prof. Uday. Thank you from all of us with deep gratitude.” Rtn. Sonali Parekh appreciated the patience and learning, while Rtn. Rina Deora, Rtn. Kaavya Chandiramani, Rtn. Miral Shah, Rtn. Gaurav Nevatia and Rtn. Jagdish Malkani echoed similar sentiments.

Special appreciation was extended to Rtn. Malti Jain for her thoughtful hospitality and delicious refreshments. As Rtn. Sushil Chandiramani aptly remarked, it truly felt like “an AI picnic”.

What began as a three-hour workshop has now evolved into a vibrant learning community. The WhatsApp group remains active daily with members sharing tools, prompts, discoveries and breakthroughs. The session proved that Generative AI is not reserved for technologists. It is for anyone willing to learn, adapt and explore. At ITI Elphinstone, this Rotary cohort did exactly that, taking an inspiring step into the future, together.



Bhavishya Yaan: Parents' Meeting at NMJ School

A productive parents' meeting was held on June 22nd, 2026 at NMJ School, BMC, for the parents of students from Standards 5, 6 and 7. The meeting was organised by the Principal and teachers of the school, with the BY Mentor and teachers also in attendance.

The primary focus of the meeting was school admissions and the importance of increasing student enrolment. Parents were given detailed insights into the differences between Marathi-medium and English-medium education, helping them better understand the value offered by NMJ School.

The BY Mentor highlighted that while English-medium schools primarily provide education in English, NMJ School goes significantly further through the Bhavishya Yaan programme. Students receive Spoken English, computer education and life skills training from Standard 1 to Standard 10, completely free of cost. These benefits, often unavailable even in fee-paying schools, give NMJ students a distinct advantage.

Parents were also informed about the school's commitment to holistic development through workshops, study excursions, camps and support for higher education. Students are further empowered through



scholarships, internships and career guidance, including assistance in securing employment.

The Principal emphasised the vision of BMC schools and the many ways in which NMJ School supports students in both academic and personal growth. It was shared with great pride that NMJ School is ranked seventh among all BMC schools. The school has also consistently achieved 100 per cent results, with students securing excellent scores in the SSC Board examinations year after year.

The interaction was engaging and constructive. Parents suggested increasing awareness in nearby housing societies about the school's achievements and benefits. Another valuable suggestion was to showcase the accomplishments of NMJ alumni and the careers they have built.

The meeting concluded with discussions on the curriculum and future growth plans. It was decided that parents' meetings will now be held monthly, on the second Saturday of every month.

Anaemia Mitigation Project

PROJECTS COMPLETED DURING THE YEAR:

The Anaemia Mitigation Committee undertook a large-scale initiative in Dahanu to address anaemia among school children across Zilla Parishad and Ashram schools.

The programme included haemoglobin (Hb) testing, nutritional intervention, medical treatment, and referral of severe cases to healthcare facilities for further monitoring and care.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS:

- **Total schools covered: 188**
 - Ashram Schools: 29
 - Zilla Parishad Schools: 159
- **Total children treated: 15,319**
 - Girls: 7,749
 - Boys: 7,568

The initiative successfully improved early detection, treatment, and monitoring of anaemia among children in rural communities.

PROJECTS COMPLETED DURING THE YEAR:

- **Zirak Marker Art Charity Event** on December 17th, 2025 in collaboration with the Contemporary Art & Museum Committee and Free Press Journal. The event raised awareness and funds for stray animal welfare, rehabilitation, adoption, and sterilisation initiatives. Total funds raised amounted to Rs. 4,40,000, with allocations made towards WSD and YODA for sterilisation programmes. DURING THIS YEAR

PROJECTS COMPLETED DURING THE YEAR:

In its 17th year, Bhavishya Yaan directly benefited 1,132 students across four BMC schools at Prabhadevi (280), G.K. Marg (175), Byculla (412) and N.M. Joshi Marg (265). Over 100 students appeared for SSC examinations, with all four schools achieving a 100% pass result. Scholarships and internship programmes continued for eligible students.

PROJECTS COMPLETED DURING THE YEAR:

The Mankhurd Early Intervention Centre continued to support neurodivergent children from birth to 6 years and their families through structured early intervention services.

- **Special Education and Preschool Stimulation:** Helping children achieve their maximum learning potential.
- **Group Therapy Sessions:** Improving social and communication skills.
- **Occupational Therapy:** Providing structured sensory stimulation to improve body awareness and functional development.
- **Developmental Assessments:** Conducted by psychologists for intervention planning and progress tracking.

PROJECTS COMPLETED DURING THE YEAR:

The Environmental Science Studies (ESS) programme, developed by the Panchatattva Committee of the Rotary Club of Bombay, continued to empower and sensitise students towards environmental awareness and sustainable practices.

Designed for students in Standards VII, VIII and IX, the programme reached 3,830 students across 23 schools in Mumbai and Palghar.

The ESS curriculum was developed by environmental scientists (ex-BNHS) and academicians, and peer reviewed by reputed researchers and practitioners. Designed as a co-curriculum for Environmental Studies, it comprises 9 handbooks in Marathi, Hindi and English across 3 levels, covering 45 topics, with 20% focus on practical training based on regional biodiversity. Efforts are

underway to align the curriculum with NCERT for nationwide rollout.

In Palghar, the programme has been implemented in 16 schools, benefiting 3,500 students. The preparation and implementation cost of the curriculum is approximately INR 2.5 million, with funds already secured.

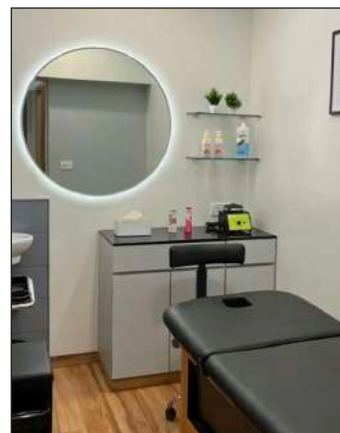
The Transformation Salon is an initiative of the Rotary Club of Bombay aimed at empowering the transgender community through inclusive livelihood opportunities in the beauty and wellness sector.

Over the last three years, the initiative has helped identify suitable premises, design inclusive interiors, train team members, and establish a community-led beauty salon that is now fully self-sustaining.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS FOR FY 2025-26:

- Total Revenue Generated: Rs. 19.86 lakhs
- Total Client Footfall: 2,257 clients
- Average Ticket Size: Rs. 880
- Repeat Client Share: 44%
- Highest Revenue Contributors: Haircare, Styling, Spa and Grooming Services

The salon maintained consistent revenue performance across all four quarters despite market fluctuations and successfully sustained community-led operations, with trainees transitioning into paid service roles.



IMPACT STORY:

The initiative has created meaningful livelihood opportunities and restored dignity through skill development, confidence building, and economic independence.

A notable example is Neha, who joined as an intern during FY 2025-26 after facing unstable income and workplace discrimination. Over time, she transitioned into independently handling grooming and haircare appointments, gained client trust, achieved financial stability, and inspired others from the community to join the programme.

- Replaced old and exhausted plants with new healthy specimens.
- Introduced a visitor book for students and faculty feedback.
- Installed netting on building windows to prevent snake entry.
- Redeveloped the sensory garden with suitable plants.
- Installed a new 10,000-litre water storage tank for emergency tanker water use.
- Relaid two roads, one in the extended park area and one in the main park premises.
- Installed a new irrigation system with vertical sprinklers for quick watering of the Miyawaki.
- Installed an additional sprinkler line in the new park area for easier watering.
- Carried out pointing and repair work on pond walls before monsoon.
- Completed painting of pond railings and benches.

- Pre-monsoon pruning to promote healthy regeneration
- Planting new cuttings and shrubs during monsoon

PROJECTS COMPLETED DURING THE YEAR:

The Water Resources committee undertook the revival of a natural spring water source in Wareli Village, Ratnagiri, to provide sustainable access to clean drinking water and irrigation support for the village.

Major work completed during the year included:

- Revival and cleaning of the natural spring water source
- Construction of a protective cordon structure around the spring source
- Installation of a gravity-based pipeline system spanning approximately 3 km
- Construction of 5 village hauds (storage tanks) for water storage and distribution
- Establishment of a functional water supply system for drinking and irrigation purposes

- Completion of painting and final finishing work of the cordon and hauds
- The project was successfully completed on March 30th, 2026, and is now fully operational.

IMPACT OF THE PROJECT:

- Year-round availability of clean drinking water for the village
- Reduced dependency on external water sources and tanker supply
- Improved irrigation support for agriculture, including cashew plantations and paddy cultivation
- Reduced burden on women and children for water collection
- Improved hygiene, health, and overall quality of life
- Strengthened community participation and sustainable water management

PROJECT COST:

- The total project cost amounted to Rs. 24,96,688 (approximately Rs. 24.96 lakhs), including direct implementation and administrative costs.

ONGOING PROJECTS:

- Regular maintenance, pipeline inspection, periodic cleaning of the spring source, and community-led monitoring are being carried out by the Gram Panchayat and Village Water Committee to ensure long-term sustainability.
